COOLIDGE WINS IN MICHIGAN

FERRIS LED BY FORD, MAN WHO SAYS HE IS FOR COOLIDGE

Calvin Coolidge won a sweeping victory over Senator Hiram W. Johnson in Michigan in Monday's primary election and Henry Ford, who has declared himself not a candidate but as a Coolidge supporter, leads Ferris in the state for the Democratic presidential nomination.
