





LOWELL BOYS IN TROUBLE

TRY TO BEAT MOONSHINE GAME. STORY AS TOLD IN OTHER

Two of the boys were under 15 and were arraigned in juvenile court. The third, 17, waived examination in justice court and pleaded guilty to possession of moonshine whiskey before Circuit Judge Willis B. Perkins.

The pressing of charges against the students was the result of continued activities of bootleggers in the vicinity of Lowell, Sheriff William L. Smith said. Two weeks ago, three boys were found intoxicated on the main street of Lowell and were released by the sheriff after a reprimand. A week later two more were brought in for the same offense, but no charges were preferred. Last Friday the three boys arraigned were arrested in an automobile near Ionia. All were intoxicated and several bottles of moonshine whisky were found in the car, it is alleged.

STOREY TO CONTEST COWAN ELECTION AS GRATTAN SUPERVISOR

The re-election of Seiford J. Cowan, Grattan township farmer, as supervisor of that township by a majority of 26 votes over the Republican candidate, Emory Etorey, will be contested by the latter, it was indicated yesterday when Storey held a long conference with Prosecuting Atty. Cornelius Hoffius. Cowan's vote was 168 and Storey's was 142.

Storey is attacking 32 absent voter's ballots which he alleges were cast for Cowan in an irregular manner. These ballots, he says, were gathered by Cowan, the Democratic candidate, and a justice of the peace, without the usual formalities.

Two courses are open. Prosecutor Hoffius stated after explaining to Storey that the matter is not a subject for his office to handle. One is a recount in which an effort would be made to have these absent voters' ballots thrown out and the other would be quo warranto proceedings to inquire by what right Cowan holds office. Storey, it was said last night, has not decided which course to pursue.—Grand Rapids Harold.
