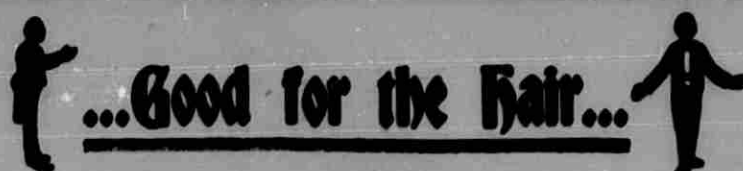

LIVE MEETING BOARD TRADE

LOCAL CREDIT EXCHANGE FORMING. GRAND STAND FOR RECREATION PARK

The May meeting of the Board of Trade was held at Hotel Waverly Tuesday, May 20. Supper was served to about 60 members, including four from the Rockford Chamber of Commerce, Messrs. Hunting, Eardley, Boyd and Peterson. These gentlemen drove over to listen to the discussion on credit exchange which is a live issue in Rockford at the present time.

After a song led by Mr. Clark, the visitors were introduced, each responding with a short talk promoting the spirit of good fellowship between the towns.

Mr. Cleveland of the Ypsilanti-Reed factory talked impromptu on his business relations with our people and his remarks were well received.

After the reading of the minutes, the proposition of investigating all outside solicitors was discussed and a motion by Mr. Henry, supported by Mr. Ford, instructing the president to appoint a committee with power to act in this matter, was carried. This committee will investigate all outside soliciting propositions, advertising, charitable, etc., and if deemed worthy will issue a card recommending them to the members.

Report from the credit committee was read by Mr. MacFarlane and on motion was accepted and filed.

After a number of business men had talked in favor of this project, a rising vote was called for and 27 men voted to establish an exchange in Lowell. This was about 100 per cent of the members present who were personally interested.

Mr. Henry moved that the credit committee be retained and with a few additions work out a plan best adapted to our needs. Seconded and carried. Mr. Rivette moved that this committee go ahead and establish an exchange and pro rate the members. Seconded by Mr. Borgerson. Carried.

Mr. Rivette and Mr. Gazella spoke in favor of the business men helping the base ball team to build a grandstand. Moved by Mr. Runciman, seconded by Mr. Schneider, that the president appoint a committee to work out this grandstand project. Carried.

Mr. Avery proposed to make a Board of Trade group picture for the City hall. This was referred back to him to work out later.

Edwin Fallas' response to the call for a speech was read. He is a member of our new industries committee and testifies to the fact that he has no regrets for starting one factory in Lowell, but that his present policy is to build one and to build apartment houses in Los Angeles during his vacation.

Ed. Kniffin then spoke favoring the credit exchange. He also favored building a grandstand and a good one.

Meeting adjourned. Sec.

GLARING LIGHTS CAUSE ANOTHER BAD ACCIDENT

Aged Man Badly Cut About Head and Face as Car is Smashed

Glaring lights from an automobile which was approaching from the south caused a bad wreck and very near sent an aged man across the Jordan, Saturday night when the machine in which he was riding was wrecked about a mile or two south of the city. The man at the wheel was Phillip Jones and the injured man was his father, Gibson Jones, aged about 70 years.

The two men were on their return home from Owosso, where they had been attending the funeral of a relative and had got a short distance south of this city when the younger man, who was driving, was blinded by the approach of an automobile which refused to dim its lights and the Jones car went into the ditch, tipping over and completely wrecking the top and other parts of the car.

The elder Jones was rushed to Community hospital where Dr. Holland was called and attended to sewing up the several bad cuts and bruises on his head and face although he was in a bad condition, got him so that he was able to be taken to his home. The younger Jones escaped unhurt.—Helding Banner.

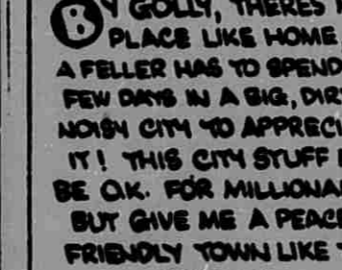
