Ionia, May 23.—Poultry stealing on a large scale has been active in Ionia county recently. Only last week a fair sized truck load of chickens was traced and recovered in Detroit before the plunder was sold. Two arrests were made Thursday and from sweating these young men enough circumstantial evidence was gleaned to induce Sheriff Cook to start at once for Cheyenne, Wyo., after one Frank Helm, who was arrested aboard a train nearing Cheyenne. It is believed by the sheriff's force that this one gang of three men has done about all the stealing and that operations have covered a period of six months.
