DOINGS OF THE LOWELL SCHOOLS

The Lowell base ball team lost its second game of the season to Ionia last Thursday. With the exception of the 7th inning, the game was the best that the locals have played this year, it being a duel between the pitchers. Flogaus relieved Weekes from the mound the last of the 7th inning and held the visitors in check. This week Saturday, the championship of the county will be played on the local diamond. Everything is in readiness for the County Field day next Saturday. If the weather man is good, several old records should be broken this year, as there are ten schools entered, with each school well represented. A hundred and thirty-five of the best athletes of the county are sure to be here in competition. From all reports, Sparta, Grandville and Lowell are the favored ones to win, although Rockford is always a dangerous opponent in any competition. Wingeier of Lowell should lower the record for the quarter mile dash which is 45 seconds. (Sparta) should also break the standing broad jump record of 9 feet, 11 1/2 inches; while Schwab can equal the 220-yd. dash record of 24, 2-5 seconds. In every track event there are from 18-25 entries. The field events are well filled with entries, the high jump being the most popular with 30 entries in this one event. Preliminaries will be held in the forenoon and the finals in the afternoon, followed by a championship base ball game. This meet is held in Kent county, so reserve the day for a picnic dinner and athletic sports. Seniors are very busy finishing their final exams and completing all work. Special Notice: Class Night exercises will be held in the Ryerson School auditorium instead of at the City hall as was previously announced. This is Tuesday evening, June 10, beginning at eight, p. m.

Grandstand for Athletic Park
The matter of building a grandstand at Beebe park with a seating capacity of 180, which has been discussed by the Board of Trade, the Village Council and a committee of the former, seems likely to come to a head in the near future. The Council has voted to finance the building of the foundation at an expense not exceeding \$170, also to provide and maintain insurance on the building. If the budget prepared by the B. of T. officary meets the approval and support of the members, funds sufficient to put up the building with the help of some voluntary aid by the base ball boys and fans, will be available. A reasonable deficiency could doubtless be made up by admission to the park and stand at special events provided for the purpose.
Recreation park is one of the most beautifully situated resort grounds in the state and should be provided with a grandstand.

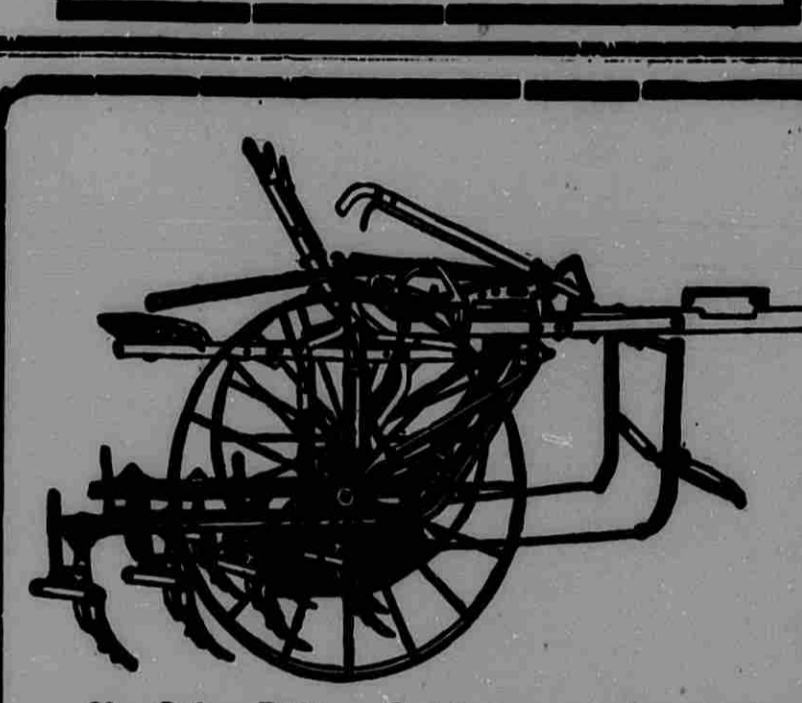
