CELEBRATE THE FOURTH

AEROPLANE FLIGHTS, SPORTS, BASE BALL GAME, BAND MUSIC, PAVEMENT DANCE, FIREWORKS.

All roads lead to Lowell on the Fourth of July this year. Plan for a picnic dinner with your neighbors and friends and make this a day of real old fashioned celebration. The streets will be decorated with the National colors in the recently adopted Shenandoah style. It certainly will be an inspiring sight to see about fifty large flags waving from twelve foot flag staffs, one in front of each business house along the pavement.

The morning will be turned over to the small boy with the firecrackers and the toy balloon and the program will probably start about noon.

The committee have as yet been unable to contract for a band but an aeroplane will be here to do some exhibition flying as well as to take up passengers for sight seeing. The landing place will probably be at Recreation park.

A good program of sports has been arranged. These will be in charge of the American Legion.

There will be a tug of war between Grattan and Boston townships with Merrill Byrne and Reuben Lee as captains. A greased pole will be a feature you will not care to miss. The 85 bill on the top belongs to the one who climbs up to it. A barrel race, a fat man's race, 225 lb. minimum, a 100 yard dash, and a progressive quilt pitching contest in doubles, all events open to all contestants.

The base ball game promises to be a high class exhibition. Lowell has recently strengthened her lineup by signing six new salaried players. The Hastings Independents are booked for the day and an interesting game is in prospect.

The fireworks are here and a committee from the Legion have charge of the firing. The fireworks program consists of fifty-five different numbers—arena and aerial pieces, several large set pieces varying from six to twenty feet across, bombs, rockets, mines, etc. Full directions for safe firing will be observed.

The pavement dance during the evening fireworks display will complete the day's program.

The Lowell band in their new uniforms will furnish several concerts during the day and the sports committee are on the lookout for a surprise number to send out a full and complete old fashioned Fourth of July celebration.

GRAND STAND NEWS.

The Board of Directors voted to include the cost of a grandstand in the Board of Trade budget for 1924 providing sufficient funds could be raised, the grandstand to be secondary to the regular budget.

The budget committee has been taking subscriptions during the past week. To date about 80 subscribers have signed up on a weekly payment plan for seventeen weeks beginning June 14. Amount pledged to date \$1700 with a number yet to be seen.

If the committee continues to meet with as good success as the start-off would indicate, enough funds will be available to build the grandstand proposed, seating capacity 450 people. Estimated cost \$1350, including foundation \$170. The council have voted to stand the cost of the foundation \$170, and to keep the building insured. If the building can be completed for the above figure pledges for about \$600 more would cover the total cost. Miss Mary Archart has been appointed official collector and has about completed the first week's collection. Sec'y.

COUNTRY SUPERVISORS READY FOR TAX FIGHT

Six country members of the board of supervisors returned from Lansing, where they conferred with George Lord, member of the State tax commission, with a view of obtaining ammunition when the question of tax equalization comes before the session of the Kent county board to open here next week.

Prospects of a lively battle between township and city supervisors, again loom in view of the statement made by the delegation to Lansing that traveled to Lansing that there is little hope of an amicable agreement in obtaining a tax ratio favorable to both sides.

Revised tax figures sought by the committee, composed of Supervisors Griswold of Spencer, Weaver of Byron, Walsh of Nelson, Church of Tyrone, Laubach of Sparta and Ferneau of Solon were not obtainable, they were informed, as the figures will not be made public until after the August equalization meeting of the state tax commission.
