LOWELL BOYS MUSTERED IN

MEMBERSHIP OF LOWELL PLATOON, NUMBERING FORTY, TO CAMP AT GRAYLING.

The Lowell platoon of the Grand Rapids Battalion, comprising 40 men, was officially mustered into National Guard service last night at Lowell. Capt. Willard E. Smith, regular army instructor at the Army, addressed the recruits and stressed the importance of the annual encampment at Grayling Aug. 8-23. "The instruction you will receive will not only prepare you for active duty, in the event of national emergency, but will be beneficial to you in your civil occupations," said Capt. Smith.

Over 30 recruits were accepted at the Army last night. Additional uniforms and equipment have been received from the quartermaster general. Every man will go to camp fully equipped. Camp pay rolls are being prepared and will be signed by all units of the regiment. All men who enlist prior to August 7 will receive full pay while at Grayling. The Service company enlisted five bandmen Tuesday night. Specialists' ratings are now authorized for musicians, which nearly doubles the pay of all members of the band who qualify.—Grand Rapids Herald, July 30.
