APOLOGIZES TO SMITH

SPARTA MAN RETRACTS AND SUIT AGAINST HIM IS DROPPED

Claude E. Gillette of Sparta, who has been charged with criminal libel by Sheriff William L. Smith, following statements alleged to have been made against the character of the county official, Monday offered complete retraction and proceedings in justice court against him were dropped by order of prosecuting attorney Hoffius.

Sheriff Smith in asking that the case be dropped said: "I have no personal quarrel with Gillette. I want no revenge. I want no money, but I do want this smirch against my reputation wiped out. The retraction by Mr. Gillette is satisfactory to me and I am willing that the matter be dropped."

Mr. Gillette's retraction as sent to the sheriff in part is as follows: "On or about the fifteenth day of July, 1924, two strangers came to my place of business and ordered ice cream. I served them and while they were seated at the table they engaged in conversation concerning you. I was quite well acquainted with your deputy, J. C. Hodgins, who lives at Sparta, I went to Mr. Hodgins and in the presence of D. J. Johnson repeated the statements which I had heard at my store, finally requesting your deputy to make an investigation. I assure you I did this with the best of motives, since I knew your deputy, and not with any intent of wrongfully injuring you. I sincerely apologize to you for any possible injury this statement may have done to you and trust that by the public notice this matter has been given these rumors have been effectually stopped."

There was no foundation to the report that you were drunk, intoxicated and taken to police headquarters and that a quart of intoxicating liquors was taken from your possession. "I had no desire to injure you and what I did was not with malicious intent."—Grand Rapids News.

MARL DIGGING DEMONSTRATIONS IN KENT COUNTY

Kent county will be visited by the Marl Digging Demonstration train from the Michigan Agricultural college on August 15, 20 and 22, according to announcement this week by Larry F. Livingston, extension specialist with the M. A. C. Agricultural engineering department, who is in charge of the marl extraction campaign.

The demonstration will be staged on the Roy Dodge farm at the end of the cement on Kalamazoo avenue in Gaines township on August 15th, the D. C. Rowland farm in Cannon township on August 20th. The Rowland farm is one mile north of M-44 between Silver and Boatwreck lakes. The Frank Brew farm, one and one-half miles west of Boyne Center off of M-36, on August 22nd. Watch for signs and arrows.

Farmers and others who attend the meeting will witness the actual extraction of marl from the bed, the method of handling from the bed to the field, and the proper manner of placing it on the fields, the last under the direction of a specialist from the M. A. C. Soils department. Two complete outfits, consisting of two types of buckets and two or more types of hoists for handling the buckets, will be used by the demonstration team, which will travel by motor truck from one location to another. The chief feature of these outfits is their small size and low operating costs, making possible the widespread use of the natural marl deposits in Kent county by individual farmer or small groups of farmers.

County Agricultural Agent K. K. Vining is in charge of local arrangements for the three Kent county demonstrations.

POULTRY MEN TO TOUR KENT COUNTY AUGUST 11

Kent county's part of the State wide poultry tour being conducted by the Poultry department of the Michigan Agricultural college will be staged Monday, August 11. The tour will start at the Haight hatcheries at Cedar Springs at 8:00, fast time. The next stop will be at the Ferris poultry farm on Plainfield road at 10:45; then to the W. H. Collette farm near Grandville at 11:30. The afternoon tour will start at the Gerrit Keiser farm south of Byron Center at 1:30 o'clock. At the farm of E. W. Rubeck at 2:30 near Caledonia and the last stop at the farm of Arthur Clark near Boyne Center at 4:30 o'clock.

J. A. Hannah, Extension specialist in poultry from the Michigan Agricultural college, and Dr. Sixsmith, who has been making a specialty of poultry diseases, will be on the trip. These men will discuss poultry management and diseases. There will be an opportunity for questions and discussions. Different phases of poultry care and will be shown as soon as the trip. People attending are urged to bring their dinner and spend the entire day on the tour. County Agent K. K. Vining will have charge of the arrangements.

COCHRAN STIRS EM UP AGAIN

FORMER LOWELL PASTOR CHALLENGES LANSING PREACHER TO DEBATE

From The Grand Rapids Herald. Lansing, August 6.—Rev. Frank Kingdon, pastor of the Central Methodist church, who in a sermon Sunday characterized as "insanely folly" the proposed National Defense test for Sept. 12, was severely taken to task today by Edgar Cochran, secretary of the state conservation commission.

Mr. Cochran termed the pastor's denunciation as "not good common sense," and said at the conclusion of his remarks that Rev. Kingdon's utterance was such an "intemperate one" that he would be glad to meet the Lansing pastor in debate at any time and anywhere to convince any audience that Rev. Kingdon is not familiar with the purpose or aims of National Defense day.

Mr. Cochran's challenge, made at the noon-day meeting of the Lion's club, was immediately accepted by officials of the club on behalf of Rev. Kingdon.

Expected Debate. Mr. Cochran had attended the Lion's dinner meeting under the impression that the Lansing pastor would be there to debate the issue, but when Mr. Cochran arrived the announcement was made that Rev. Kingdon had already left town on a two weeks' vacation trip.

Through a strange coincidence the two men met at a party given at Lowell, where Cochran, formerly a minister at Lowell, was criticized or some Grand Rapids ministers and was in turn roundly scored by Rev. King D. Beach, the latter missed an opportunity of debating pacifism through the intervention of a vacation tour.

Mr. Cochran's address was in the main a stirring warning against the tendency to forget the national safety. He characterized America as "the richest booty on the face of the globe" and warned that greedy nations with "greedy eyes" focused on this country.

In Europe and Asia Minor today, Mr. Cochran stated, are 22 nations so dangerously near the breaking point of friendly relations that any single rupture might lead to war.

In Germany children in the grade schools are being taught the rudiments of military training. Cochran said this country should not be asleep, Cochran warned against the possibility of again becoming embroiled in international trouble.

Briefly Mr. Cochran, who is chaplain of the 339th Field Artillery, sketched the purpose of the nation's first and second line defense in times of peace. He then launched into an explanation of the reason for National Defense day, terming it as nothing more than an opportunity for intervention to ascertain just where the stands in defense matters in time of peace.

On motion of trustee Yeiter, supported by trustee Day, the building permit of Mrs. A. Mattieri was granted. Yeas, 4.

C. H. Runciman and others were heard in regard to the grandstand proposition.

Mr. Cochran's commissioners submitted to the following report: Lowell, Michigan, July 21, 1924.

To the Honorable Common Council of the Village of Lowell: Gentlemen:

You will please be advised that we, as fire commissioners of the village of Lowell, have made a careful inspection of the blacksmith shop located on the east one-third (1/3) of lot 7, and the west two-thirds (2/3) of lot 6, block 8, of Avery's plat of the village of Lowell, Michigan, record title to which stands in the name of James Gulliford.

This building is deemed by us to be structurally unsafe, beyond repair and a fire hazard to the safety and protection of the village of Lowell. It is also a menace and a danger to children and others being in and about said building. It is our judgment that this building should be condemned entirely.

For the above reasons, we have served notice upon George W. Gulliford, Administrator of the estate of James Gulliford, deceased, of 646 Bethune ave., Detroit, Michigan, to remove and destroy this building at once.

Respectfully submitted, E. O. Wadsworth, R. B. Boylan, R. T. Ford, Fire Commissioners of the Village of Lowell.

Trustee Yeiter submitted the following resolution and moved its adoption, supported by trustee Day:

Whereas, E. O. Wadsworth, R. B. Boylan and R. T. Ford, fire commissioners of the village of Lowell, have filed a report with this council showing that they have inspected the blacksmith shop located on the east one-third (1/3) of lot 7, and the west two-thirds (2/3) of lot 6, block 8, Avery's plat, village of Lowell, record title to which stands in the name of James Gulliford; that they deem said building structurally unsafe, beyond repair and a fire hazard to the safety and protection of the village of Lowell; that in their judgment said building should be entirely removed and destroyed; Yeas, 4.

Resolved, that they have served a notice on George W. Gulliford, Administrator of the estate of James Gulliford, deceased, Detroit, Michigan, to appear at said meeting on August 4, 1924, and show cause why said building should not be declared a fire hazard to the safety and protection of said village, and the same condemned, removed and destroyed; Yeas, 4.

Absent, trustees Doyle and Watson.

Moved by trustee Thomas, supported by trustee Day, that the council rescind the action of the council of May 19, 1924, to build a foundation for a grandstand, and that we accept thirteen hundred dollars (\$1300.00) from the Lowell Board of Trade, and proceed to erect a grandstand at a cost of twenty-one hundred dollars (\$2100.00) per contract to be made with J. E. Hays, Yeas, 4; absent, trustees Doyle and Watson.

On motion by trustee O'Harrow, supported by trustee Day, the building of the grandstand was referred to the Park committee with power to act. Yeas, 4; absent, trustees Doyle and Watson.

Moved by trustee Thomas, supported by trustee Day, that a sewer be constructed on Washington street to take care of water and sewage and that an engineer be employed to lay out the sewer and the assessment district. Yeas, 4; absent, trustees Doyle and Watson.

On motion by trustee Thomas, supported by trustee Yeiter, the matter of the purchase of a safe cabinet was referred to the clerk and finance committee with power to act. Yeas, 4; absent, trustees Doyle and Watson.
