WOMAN KILLED at MURRY LAKE

MRS. JULIA HALL OF GRAND RAPIDS CRUSHED UNDER HEAVY CAR SUNDAY MORNING

Mrs. Julia A. Hall, age 32 years, wife of George Hall of 117 Grant street, SW, Grand Rapids, was killed in an automobile accident on the road near the Lally farm, approaching Murry lake Sunday morning about 7 o'clock. She was under a Nash touring car, driven by her husband.

Mr. Hall and his sister and a gentleman friend, who were with him, escaped without serious injuries and endeavored to lift the car but were unable to do so.

They hurried to the home of Mike McAndrews, who got his car and with his wife and Mr. Hall rushed to the overturned car while Joe DeLaney at the McAndrews home telephoned for Justice Andrews at Lowell, who called Deputy Sheriff Pat Bowes, with whom he drove to the scene of the accident.

The road is narrow and hilly in that locality, but the party had it to themselves and it is hard to understand how the accident happened.

At 7:15 Mrs. Hall caught sight of the lake and called: "See the lake, we'll be there early." Followed the overturn of the car. Possibly the driver's attention left the road at the fatal moment.

Justice Andrews investigated, found no trace of liquor and decided that no inquest was necessary.

The Grand Rapids Herald of Tuesday morning reports Sheriff Smith as accused by the failure of the Lowell officers to report the accident to his office. However, the Justice's first act was to call Pat Bowes, who is deputy sheriff, not town marshal, as the Herald reports.

Mrs. McAndrews states her belief that Mrs. Hall was almost instantly killed, as she lay prone upon the ground with the weight of the heavy car bearing upon her.

Following is the report of the accident as given by The Herald Tuesday morning.

County officials today will start an investigation into the death of Mrs. Julia Hall, 32, wife of George Hall, 117 Grant street, SW, who died more than half an hour Sunday morning when she was pinned beneath an overturned automobile on the road to Murry Lake, two miles southeast of Parnell. One matter that will be probed will be the reported failure of Lowell town officers to promptly notify the county coroner of the fatality.

The body was taken to undertaking rooms here and preparations are being made for funeral services to be held Wednesday at 11 o'clock at the home and in the afternoon at Decatur. Beside the husband there is one daughter, Helen, 9.

Justice A. M. Andrews of Lowell officiated as acting coroner after the accident and permitted removal of the body. It is said, Pat Bowes, town marshal, accompanying him.

Sheriff William L. Smith declared last night he intended to carry out his plan to prosecute all persons who do not report to his office accidents happening outside the city and within the county. "We're going to know how accidents happen and whether any negligence has been the cause of them, and arrests will follow if the state law providing for the reporting of accidents, is not observed," he said.

LEARN'S TRAGEDY WAS REPORTED TO CLERK

Wednesday's Press has the following:

Sheriff William L. Smith went to Lowell Tuesday to ascertain why his office or that of the coroner had not been advised of the automobile accident Sunday morning near Murry lake when Mrs. Julia A. Hall, 32, of 117 Grant st., SW, was killed.

Justice A. M. Andrews of Lowell informed the sheriff he had filed a complete account of the accident with the county clerk and had believed that was sufficient and that he was not aware the sheriff should have been notified. Coroner J. B. Hilliker ruled Justice Andrews within his rights in ordering the disposal of the body, but said the coroner always should be notified immediately in cases of this kind as is directed by law. The report to the county clerk, he said, leaves no chance for first-hand information if more is desired.

MEMORIAL TO C. J. BRADISH

Sunday, August 3, toward midnight, Clinton Joshua Bradish, passed away, aged 74 years. The funeral was held Wednesday forenoon. It was in every respect appropriate, and the double service was very impressive, leaving us looking upward and beyond. Rev. Blair conducted the first half of the service. He read comforting passages of scripture and inexpressible sympathy and esteem for him, who is the head of all things. The singing of "One Sweetly Solemn Thought" and "Thy Will be Done" by Mrs. C. H. Runciman was especially beautiful. She was accompanied on the piano by one of Mr. Bradish's brothers, Mason, B. D. Stocking. Then the Masonic order in their impressive ritual bade farewell to their comrade, completing the ceremony at the cemetery. The floral offerings were many and varied in expression of sympathy and esteem in which Mr. Bradish was held by all who knew him. All the members of the immediate family were present, brothers, sisters and relatives from Pierson, Grand Rapids, Lansing and other places.

May 9, 1850, Clinton J. Bradish was born at Grass Lake, Mich. April 29, 1879, he was married to Inez H. Johnson at Augusta who died Aug. 14, 1884, at Sand Lake, leaving one child, Kittie Mae, 3 years old. June 6, 1887, he married Elvora Dillon at Portland, Mich. To this union were born three children, Clifton Harrison, Fay Cassius and Hobart. Hobart died in 1896, at the age of one year, and in 1913 Fay Cassius died at 22 years of age. July 24, 1909, he married Loula M. Merriman at Lowell.

He leaves his wife, a daughter, Mrs. Glen Martin, a son, Clifton H., two brothers, Dr. Geo. M. and Luther Bradish, both of Grand Rapids, two sisters, Mrs. S. B. Newcomb of Pierson and Mrs. Ella McCormick of Grand Rapids, a half-sister, Mrs. Adaline Springstead, of Grand Rapids, four grandchildren, Elliott, Inez, and Harriet Martin, and Barbara Jessie Bradish, besides many other relatives and friends.

He united with the Methodist church at Lowell when Rev. Russell H. Bready was pastor, and April 16, 1922, transferred his membership to the Congregational church. In 1890, he became a member of the Masonic order at Cedar Springs and later brought his permit to Lowell lodge, F. & A. M. No. 90. He was a senior warden of Cedar Springs lodge and was prepared to assume the duties of worshipful master of that lodge when he moved to Lowell. He was also a member of O. E. S., No. 94 and held the office of sentinel at the time of his death.

It was in April, 1853, that his parents brought C. J. Bradish, then a little fellow three years old, from Grass Lake to Grand Rapids township, where they bought an 80-acre farm, with four acres cleared, which was the site of the family homestead for the parents' lifetime. Some of the homestead acres are still in their possession. Growing up in this environment, near to nature, made him a real man. Early in life he learned to work, and has been in business at Sand Lake, Cedar Springs and Lowell. With the exception of short stays, two or three times, he has spent all his life in Kent county. He was a man of musical tastes and for many years was connected with orchestras and bands in the different places where he lived. He is of good report wherever he has been. One of the most kindly, lovable natures, radiating cheerfulness wherever he went. His heart has been torn by sorrows and sorrow came into his life; but only to make him braver and gentler. Some one said of him the other day, "He was a good man in his family." His fraternal brothers will testify to his interest in the work of the order. His friends will miss him, for his magnetic personality made itself felt at all times. He had a live interest in people and events of the day. His had been the privilege of living through the period when invention and discovery had opened up the world.

From the isolation of the beginning years on the uncleared Knapp road far to the time when at 72 years old, taking his little granddaughter Barbara with him, he went to New York city for a ten day trip, he never lagged, but carried on, interested and interesting, so we must say farewell to a good man, a good brother and a good citizen. As a sincere Christian, he has fought a good fight, he has finished his course. We are thankful for the life that has given us a friend and the inspiration of one who was conqueror in the common experiences of humanity.

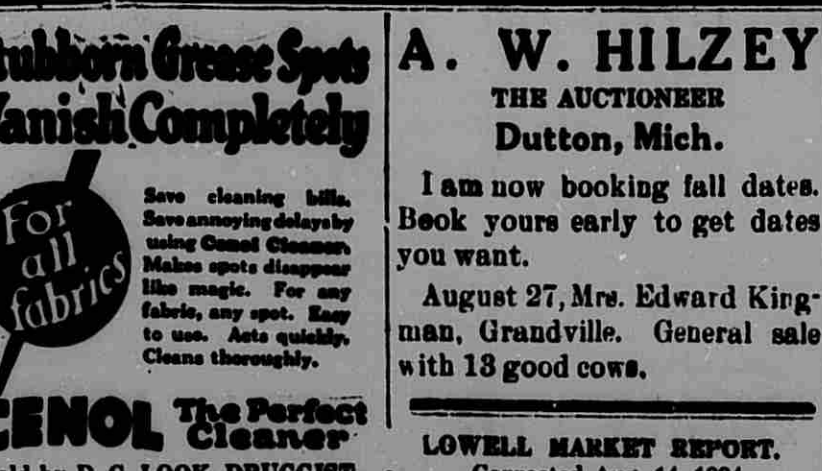

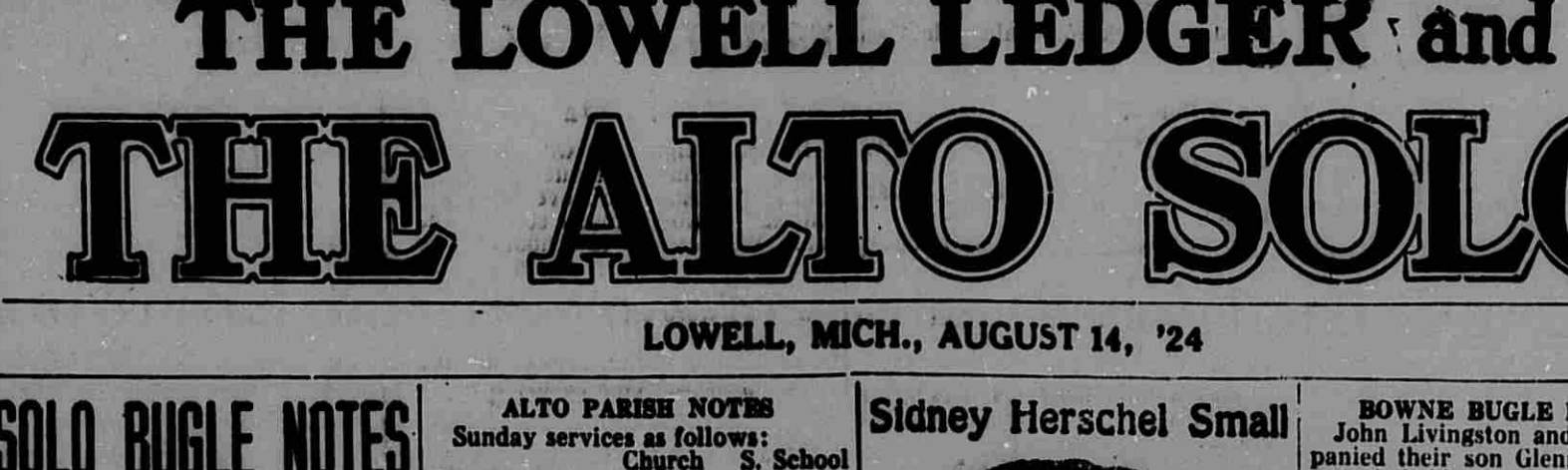
