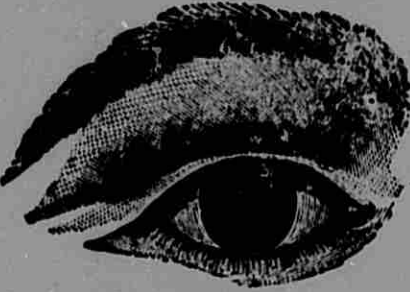
Soon the leaves will begin to turn and fall and always at this time of the year we are reminded that we must prepare for the hardships of winter.

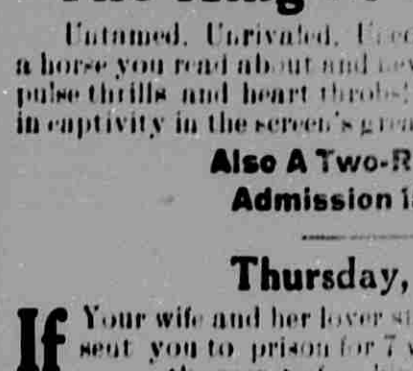
