ADA OCTOGENARIAN LIVES TO REGRET HIS STAND AGAINST LINCOLN

Ada, Mich., Sept. 20.—James W. Eardley, who has passed his eighty-fourth birthday anniversary, has not voted a straight ticket since 1865, when Lincoln was assassinated. Now he is backing Calvin Coolidge

for president.

Eardley, the first white child born in Cascade township, regrets the day, back in 1862, when the Civil war was at its hight, that he, like many other northerners, was for giving up the fight and urging, with Horace Greeley, to "let the erring sisters go." sisters go."
