#### **DEAN COOLEY** HERE TO-DAY

Less politics, more engineering, is needed in Congress, Mortimer E. Cooley, dean of the college of engineering, University of Michigan, Democratic candidate for U. S. Senator, is telling the people of Michigan on his speaking tours. He is scheduled here for an address today, October 2.

With America's future dependent upon correct solution of vast engineering problems, beside which political issues of the hour fade into insignificance, there is need in Congress for trained engineers to create laws which will intelligently deal with important questions, says Dean Cooley. At the present time there is not an experienced engineer in either house or Congress.

"When I think of the opportunities for service to the people that are offered it seems that all the little things in politics become mere pimples on the body politic," he says, what confronts the people appalls me at times, when I think of how we neglect to frame our legislation for the future. The one thing for us to take into consideration now is ability of the men we send to Congress,"

"It isn't enough that they be honst and intelligent. They should have the training to cope with the problems that will confront us."

Dean Cooley cites as examples of problems to be considered shortly the proposed Great Lakes-St. Lawrence waterway, which would make Michigan's ports accessible to vessels from all countries, the development of water power supplementing wherever possible coal generated energy, problems of railroad consolidation and reforestation.

Last year engineers of the nation bestowed upon Dean Cooley the highest honor which can be accorded one of that profession by electing him president of the Affiliated Technical Societies of America. He has been consultant on many engineering problems, ranging from a village's water supply to the construction of a transcontinental railway.
