CITY DELIVERY STARTS NOV. 1

Postmaster Borgerson informs The Ledger that it is planned to begin city mail delivery November 1, instead of this week, as originally intended.

Postponement is due to the non-arrival of necessary equipment and the fact that appointment of regular carriers have not yet been made. In case regular carriers have not been appointed by the new date set, temporary carriers will be employed.

Residence districts will get one delivery daily, leaving the Post office at 8:30 a. m.

The business section will get three deliveries, starting at 7:30 and 8:30 a. m., and 2 p. m., respectively.

People keeping boxes at the Post office can secure undelivered mail there as usual.

Doubtless some wrinkles will come up that will have to be ironed out later, until all the workings of the new system are understood.

NO DIPHTHERIA CASES HERE NOW

Believing the truth better than exaggerated and false reports circulated by rumor, Health Officer Andrews authorizes the following report:

There are now no known cases of diphtheria in Lowell this Thursday morning.

There has been one case in the Wood family in the West part of town. The patient has recovered. House still quarantined.

One boy in Otis Potter's family was ill. Has recovered. Quarantine raised.

Little Vera Luz died.

East Ward school closed. Children inspected and medically treated.

Today Lowell doctors aided by a County nurse and the health officer are completing the work of inspecting throats of children in other departments of the Lowell schools. We are assured that nothing will be left undone to eradicate the disease in this community.

WOULD PROBATE WILL

John Krum of Vergennes township, one of the principal beneficiaries in the estate of Mary L. Adams, who died Sept. 26, has petitioned probate court for the admission of Mrs. Adams' will to probate. The petitioner is given an undivided one-half interest in three brick store buildings in Lowell, half of which he already owned. The residue after a number of specific bequests are made, is to be divided equally among Sarah Lyon, Mattie Thompson and Bertha Hawley. Hearing will be Oct. 31—Grand Rapids Herald.

OBITUARY—HARRY W. KINYON

Harry W., son of Egbert L. and Nettie J. Kinyon, was born September 3, 1888, in Lowell and spent his entire life here except about three years with the family in Chicago and Whitehall.

The father died September 26, 1923, leaving Harry with his mother and brother Clyde.

Harry's death resulted from injuries received in a fall from a truck September 30 and followed only eleven days later, during which time his devoted mother and others did everything possible, but in vain, for his relief.

COUNCIL FACES SEWER SCRAP

The Lowell Village Council appears to be in a "Twixt the devil and the deep blue sea" situation, regarding the East Washington street sewer project, official information and legal notice of which have been published in this paper for several weeks past.

On petition of property owners concerned and after due notice the building of the sewer as per description given in legal advertisement on the insert page of this issue, was determined upon.

At the Council meeting Monday evening a remonstrance against the building of the sewer, signed by forty-two taxpayers was presented, while Dr. J. P. Draper, whose residence property is certainly in a bad way as regards sanitary conditions, presented his case in a vigorous and determined manner personally. It is only fair to state that his assessment, if the sewer is built, will be \$244, the highest involved, which he does not object to.

Some of the objectors are already served in a sewer way, either satisfactorily or partially so, some by small private sewers, while many are periodically troubled with backwater from the river or a surplus of surface water in rainy seasons, all of which constitute real grievances.

On account of an error in the description of the Sewer district, an first published a new notice of "Hearing of Objections" is given on the insert page of this issue of The Ledger, and date is set for October 31 at the Council rooms at 8 p. m.

It is to be hoped that a way out of the difficulty satisfactory and fair to all may be found; but the solution at this time does not seem easy.

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Vote "No" On The Proposed Income Tax Amendment THE REASONS MULTIPLY It would destroy the very basis for the present Railroad Taxes, and Public Utility Taxes generally, for which the people have fought for years in the days of Pinglee, and enable them all to escape all taxes, except those levied locally under the general law, until this proposed amendment, if adopted, be repealed or amended by the people, at a general election.

Up to Pinglee's time the State Constitution required a uniform rule for assessing taxes, as follows: "Sec. 2. The Legislature shall provide by law a uniform rate of taxation, except on property paying specific taxes, and taxes shall be levied on such property as shall be prescribed by law."

After a long fight, it was amended by adding the following clause: "Provided that the Legislature shall provide by law a uniform rate of taxation for all property, shall be assessed by the State Board of Assessors, and the rate of taxation on such property shall be the rate which the State Board of Assessors shall ascertain and determine is the average rate levied upon other property upon which ad valorem taxes are assessed for State, County, Township, School and Municipal purposes."

That clause is there today, and has been sustained by the courts, after protracted litigation. It is the only constitutional basis for millions of dollars of railroad and other public utility taxes, annually, which will have no basis whatever if this proposed amendment is adopted, for it puts the proposed income tax provision IN THE PLACE OF THE ABOVE PROVISION, NOT BELOW IT. The effect is substantially to reduce railroad taxes and other public utility taxes, which form the resource for a large part of the Primary School Fund.

Do the farmers want this gap filled by additional real estate taxes? This proposed amendment is beyond belief, I agree. Several here would not believe it, when this discovery was made, until a trusted man was sent to Lansing to examine the proposed amendment. However crazy a proposal it is, it has been put under way and there is no way to escape its effect, if the proposed amendment is adopted.
