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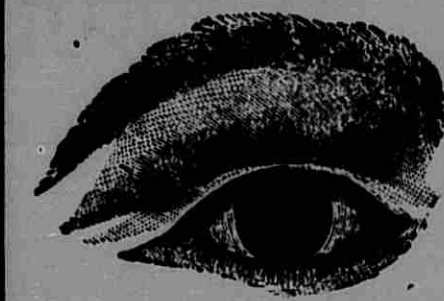

### KILLED BY HIS OWN GUN

G. R. MAN IS FATALLY SHOT IN HUNTING MISHAP NEAR LOWELL

Plans for a birthday party came to a tragic end when Jacob Sonnema, 1653 Jefferson ave., SE., was fatally shot through the abdomen by a discharge from his own gun while hunting yesterday morning near Lowell.

Sonnema, who was to have celebrated his twenty-first birthday today, was accompanied by Richard Olree, 1653 Jefferson ave., ES, when the accident occurred. According to Olree, Sonnema had stood his gun beside a stump and was lighting a cigarette when the weapon fell to the ground and exploded. Sonnema called to his companion, "I'm shot," and then fell over.

Olree called a farmer, who brought the injured man to Lowell. They were met there by an ambulance which took him to St. Mary's hospital. He died yesterday afternoon.

Sonnema came to the United States from the Netherlands four years ago, and was employed as a traveling furniture salesman by David B. DeYoung. His father, two brothers and a sister, all living in the Netherlands, survive.

Funeral arrangements will await a reply. The body was taken to Metcalf's morgue. —Grand Rapids Herald, Dec. 8.

### DR. HUNTLEY IS PROMOTED

FORMER LOWELL DOCTOR TO DIRECT INSTITUTIONAL HEALTH ADMINISTRATION IN MICHIGAN

The Ionia Sentinel-Standard has the following respecting Dr. W. B. Huntley, who for several years prior to the World war was a practicing physician in Lowell, where he succeeded Dr. W. O. Merrill:

Dr. W. B. Huntley, who for the past three years has been the resident physician at the Michigan reformatory, and for a shorter period city physician of Ionia, today announced that he would quit both posts Wednesday morning. He was in consultation with city officials Tuesday afternoon in regard to his leaving the city physician's post.

Dr. Huntley Wednesday will assume the directorship of institutional health administration for Michigan Tuesday afternoon in Lansing Tuesday night where his offices are to be. Dr. Huntley, however, will continue to reside in Ionia.

He received notice last Monday afternoon of his appointment to the state work, which will necessitate his visiting all state institutions quarterly and the penal institutions monthly, for the purpose of directing the medical conduct of these institutions.

Dr. L. B. Whitman, who has been Dr. Huntley's assistant here for some time, will succeed him at the reformatory.

Dr. Huntley's administration in charge of the health of the local administration has been a most satisfactory one, and he has much to do with building up the program health oversight which is so successful here.
