## KENT COUNTY TO BE SUED

**MCCAUL, SMITH, JEPSON, WEBER  
BRIDGE ACCIDENT CASE  
UP FOR TRIAL**

From The Ionia Sentinel-Standard. Damage suits aggregating \$40,000 in nominal damages have been or are launched against Kent county, as the result of an automobile accident November, 1923, north of Lowell, when Winnifred McCaul and Thelma Smith, Lowell high school girls, and Earl Jepson, of Saranac, went to their deaths through the racking of the bridge on State bank road. The bridge, which was under construction, was, it is alleged, negligently constructed, that it was of unlawful width, that there was a defective and insecure railing, and that the county permitted a hole in the highway at the approach to the bridge, which caused the car to skid as it struck the bridge, that there were not proper warning signs posted as required by law. The four cases will be tried separately and will come up before the Kent county court at the spring term.

Notice of the suits was served on the Kent county board of supervisors within 60 days after the accident, but actual filing of the complaints has been delayed pending the outcome of a case in Mecosta county, where death followed an automobile accident in a wash-out in the highway. This case, known as the Longstreet case, was recently decided by the supreme court of the state in favor of the plaintiff and a verdict of several thousand dollars returned against Mecosta county. In this ruling the supreme court decided that the county was liable for accidents on trunk line roads.—The Ionia Sentinel-Standard.

## VERGENNES PIONEER GONE

**EDWARD DICKSON, A LIFE-LONG  
RESIDENT OF VERGENNES, DIED  
SUNDAY, JANUARY 4, AT 3 P. M.,**  
WHILE SITTING IN HIS  
CHAIR.

Mr. Dickson was born at Port Rowan, Ontario, Canada, January 18, 1837, and at the time of his death was 87 years, 11 months and 13 days old. He came into Michigan with his parents when a boy and when this state was a wilderness, and helped his father clear the land and accumulate some valuable property and can justly be classed among the early pioneer settlers of this state.

In the fall of 1862, he married Miss Mattie Ball, who died March 21, 1911. From this happy union came four children—two sons, James Dickson and Phillip Dickson, and two daughters, the late Mrs. Cora VanWagoner, who died Jan. 6, 1916, and Mrs. Diana Waters, who was taking care of her father at the time of his death. He also left several grandchildren and great grandchildren to mourn their loss.

Mr. Dickson was one of seven children, 4 sons and 3 daughters, of the late Daniel and Nancy Dickson of Vergennes, formerly residents of Canada, and who immigrated to Michigan in an early day and helped to clear the forests and build the homesteads.

Mr. Dickson's brothers were the late William, Phillip and James Dickson, and his sisters were the late Mrs. Mattie Baldwin, Mrs. Sheldin Packer and Mrs. Sarah Patterson, who spent all their lives in Kent county, with the exception of Mrs. Baldwin, who lived part of her life in adjoining counties.

Mr. Dickson lived an industrious, honorable and honest life. He was a good neighbor and a good friend and loved his children and grand children and great grandchildren.

The funeral was held at the Bailey church at 2 p. m., Tuesday, Jan. 6, conducted by Rev. L. H. Nixon, who delivered a beautiful sermon, after which a massive casket covered with flowers, was borne by his grandsons and granddaughters' hands to the family lot in the Bailey church cemetery.—Con.

**MOVE TO PUT TOWNSHIP TREASURER ON SALARY**  
There is a growing feeling that the Lowell township treasurer's office should be placed on a salary basis. The amount of which for this township would be \$600 per year. For a number of years on the present fee system basis, the office has paid the incumbent about \$1,100 to \$1,200 per year. So, the township stands to gain about half the sum formerly given the treasurer under the present system—about \$600, while the salary allowed by law would amply repay the treasurer for official duties. A petition to the township board by taxpayers is required to initiate the change.

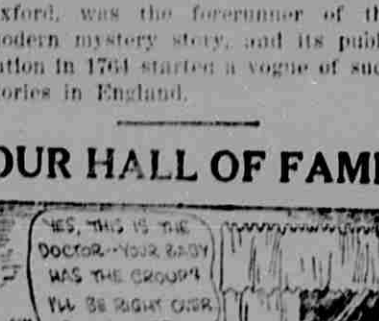
Wise Long Worn

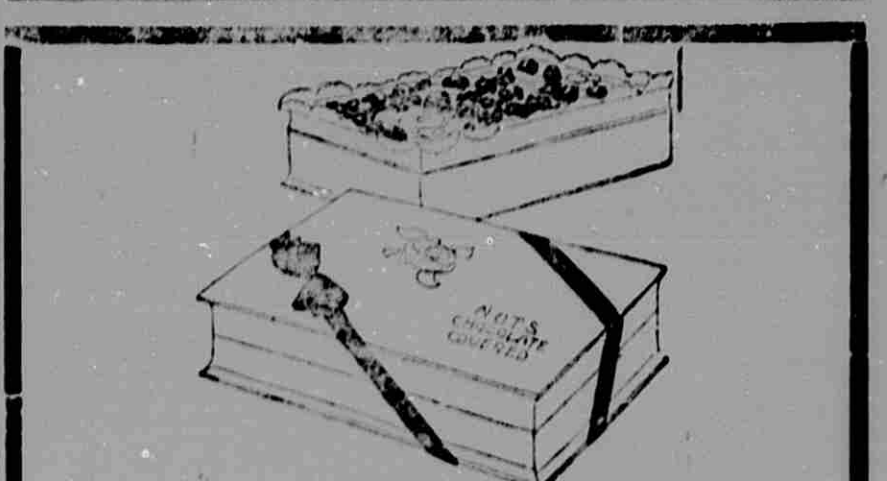
