CONSUMERS SEEK
BIG STOCK ISSUE

Lansing, Jan. 14.—(By Associated
Press)—A hearing on the petition
of the Consumers Power Co. for per-
mission to issue \$20,000,000 in pre-
ferred stock and \$1,000,000 in bonds,
the proceeds to be spent for ex-
tensions and improvements in the ter-
ritory served by the company, was
held before the public utilities com-
mission Tuesday. Among the prop-
osed extensions listed were:
\$150,000 for the St. Johns station;
\$70,000 for the Hopedyl plant on the
Manistee river; \$245,000 for the
Wealthy station steam plant, \$83,000
for new generators in the Fulton-st.
station in Grand Rapids; \$13,000 for
the Lowell plant—Grand Rapids
Press.

YOUR INCOME TAX
No. 1

Your income tax for the year 1924
is less, in proportion to your income,
than was the case for 1923. A rate
reduction, however, is not the only
benefit afforded by the revenue act
of 1924. Increase in the exemption
for married persons, a 25 per cent
reduction on "earned income," and
other changes in revenue legisla-
tion are of immediate interest to
every taxpayer.
The revenue act of 1924 requires
that returns be filed by every single
person whose net income for 1924
was \$1,000 or more, or whose gross
income was \$5,000 or more, and by
every married couple whose aggre-
gated net income was \$2,500 or more,
or whose aggregated gross income
was \$5,000 or more. Last year re-
turns were required of married
couples whose aggregated net income
was \$2,000 or more. Husband and
wife, living together, may include
the income of each in a single joint
return, or each may file a separate
return showing the income of each.
Net income is gross income less
certain specified deductions for busi-
ness expenses, losses, bad debts,
contributions, etc.
The period for filing returns is
from January 1 to March 15, 1925.
The return, accompanied by at least
one-fourth of tax due, must be filed
with the collector of internal revenue
for the district in which the tax-
payer has his legal residence or has
his principal place of business.
