JOSEPH B. YEITER
Funeral services for the late Joseph B. Yeiter were held at the Methodist church in Lowell, Sunday afternoon, Rev. J. H. Westbrook, an old friend of the family and Pastor L. H. Nixon, officiating clergyman. Burial at Oakwood cemetery. Joseph B. Yeiter, son of John and Mary Yeiter was born July 18, 1855, on a farm in Lowell township, Kent county, where he spent his early youth. He received his education in the district schools of Lowell and Grand Rapids High school. In 1882 he engaged in the drug business in Lowell and four years later sold an interest in same to D. G. Look. In 1891 he retired from this business and in the spring of 1894 re-entered business as proprietor of the furniture and undertaking establishment which was later conducted by Yeiter & Wadsworth for 17 years and more recently by Yeiter & Company. He was united in marriage March 7, 1883, to Alida, daughter of Duncan and Phila A. Campbell. To this union were born two daughters, Mrs. Lenna B. Anderson and Mrs. Florence L. Young. He was a faithful and loyal member of the Lowell Methodist church for over 40 years and was also a member of Lowell Lodge No. 90 of Masons. After his retirement from active business he moved his family to Grand Rapids where he spent his remaining years and where also he was united with the Trinity Methodist church. Joseph B. Yeiter passed away March 17, 1925, at Kalamazoo, Florida, at the age of 69 years, 8 months. He leaves to mourn his loss besides the widow, two daughters, a granddaughter, two sisters, Mrs. Elizabeth Smeiker of Freepert, Mrs. Lydia Gaebele, and one brother, Wesley Yeiter of Lowell township, besides other relatives and a host of friends.

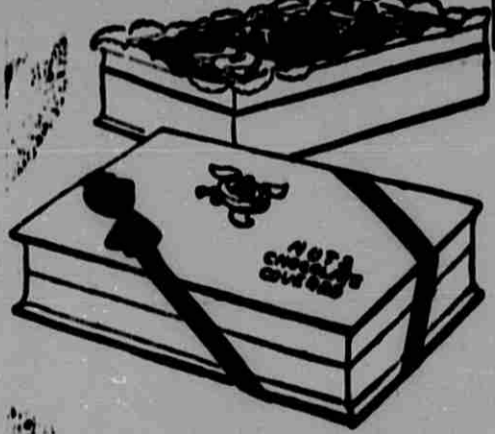
