MRS. BRADISH WINS WITH ENTIRE REPUBLICAN TICKET. DETENTION HOME DEFEATED.

With a light vote out, considering several contests and side issues, Lowell township elected the entire Republican ticket as usual by the following vote: Supervisor—M. Yeiter, 385, M. P. Schneider, 188. Clerk—F. N. White, 439, Henry Alexander, 148. Treasurer—Lula M. Bradish, 376, Minnie Clark, 204. Justice—Clarence Yeiter 394, Earl Hunter, 174. Highway Commissioner—Walter Blakelee, 444, W. J. Tredenic, 120. Board of Review—A. M. Andrews, 421, George M. Parker, 140. Highway Overseer—George Hazel, (on both tickets) 564. Constables—Charles Lawyer, 439, Ed. C. Walker, 411, Eugene Carr (on both tickets) 469, Floyd Parrott, 420, John Laver, 123, J. A. Grandy 164, George J. Rous, 123. The proposal to set Lowell township treasurer on a salary basis—\$600 per year, was carried, 481 yeas to 147 no, while the \$100,000 Detention Home move was defeated, 183 yeas to 439 no. The Republican ticket was, of course, elected 3 to 1, or worse.
