

JUDGE DENIES GEIE'S PLEA TO DISMISS \$30,000 ACTIONS AGAINST COUNTY

Confessing some doubt in his own nind whether he is right in the decision, Circuit Judge M. L. Dunham resterday denied the motion of Mty. Fred P. Geib, special counsel for the county, to dismiss the two \$10,000 damage actions brought against the county by Oris S. Smith, administrator of the estate of his daughter, Thelma Smith, and David McCaul, administrator of the estate of his daughter, Winifred McCaul.

The girls were killed on the night of Nov. 4, 1923, when an automobile in which they were riding on M-66, north of Lowell went through the guard rail of the Flat river bridge. The Consumers Power company, which the county alleges was the owner of the bridge, also is a defendant,

Judge's Viewpoint

Judge Dunham, in his opinion completed yesterday, states the arguments of Atty. Geib "disclose the fact that he had spent a very great deal of time in studying and analyzing all of the Michigan supreme court cases where questions under the death act and the survival act had been considered by it." It is also pointed out that "both parties to this controversy are anxious for an early decision that the disposition of the question by this court may be considered upon certiorari at the June, 1925, term of the supreme court of this state."

Judge Dunham then adds, "I have already spent considerable time myself in examining the authorities cited by both counsel and admit that I have some doubt as to the right of the plaintiffs to recover in these actions under the declarations in these causes against the defendant county."

Unusual Point

An unusual condition arose during the arguments. Some of the material questions argued by Atty Geib were decided against his position in a Detroit case, it is pointed out and admitted by the counsel for the county. But Atty. Geib contended the Detroit case was not correctly decided and that the decision nullifies a section of the highway damage act passed in 1887 and it was urged that Judge Dunham should not follow that decision.

"There was no question but what the controlling question in the argument of counsel to dismiss was raised and decided in that case," Judge Dunham stated. "The argument of Mr. Geib that this case should be overruled was very log-

ment of Mr. Gelb that this case should be overruled was very logical and convincing and, inasmuch as this case upon this question will go to our court of last resort, I do not feel at liberty to overrule the decision in the Detroit case.—Grand Rapids Herald, May 3.
