
OBTUARY—CLINTON A. KELLOGG.

W. J. McCARTHY SUFFERS \$12,000 FIRE LOSS, LATE MONDAY NIGHT

Ada, June 2—The third mysterious fire of the vicinity in the past month late Monday night, destroyed two barns, the tool shed and practically all their contents, together with two blooded Belgian horses on the farm of William J. McCarthy, a leading farmer of Parnell. Only two weeks ago a barn located just across the oad was burned.

Crackling of the flames Monday night awakened the McCarthy family, whose members hastened into clothes and rushed out to discover one of their big barns ablaze. Mr. McCarthy plunged into the flaming structure, but was able to free but two of his horses before being

Within 20 minutes the entire countryside, attracted by the fire that brilliantly lighted the sky, arrived to offer assistance, but in spite of their aid another barn and a too shed soon were blazing. It was only by great effort that the house and garage were saved.

Justin McCarthy, a son, sustained severe burns on the back and face and also suffered a leg injury.
