HENRY McCABE DIED AT LOMPOC

Henry E. McCabe, a former resident of Lowell, died recently at Lompoc, Cal., aged 84 years. He was born in Vergennes, April 30, 1841. Was married in December, 1870, was made a Mason in Lowell Lodge, No. 90, and lived in this vicinity until 1874. He was a Civil War veteran and saw active service in the battle of the Wilderness, Siege of Fredericksburg, battle of Gold Harbor and at Appomattox. He was the last surviving Civil War veteran in Lompoc.

Mr. McCabe visited Lowell last in 1906.

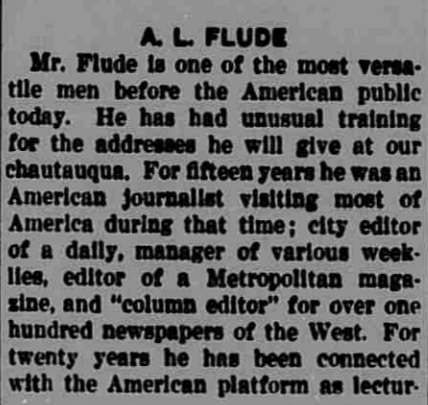
