Wolverine a Scavenger
The wolverine, the largest of the weasel tribe, while ready to fight anything of its own size, or in fact many times larger, has short legs and a heavy body which makes it a slow pursuer of live game. Consequently, the wolverine is, to a large extent, a scavenger. They will readily travel long distances to feast on dead, sick or crippled animals. They have the reputation of even feeding on the porcupine, which no other animal will eat.

Momus in Mythology
In classical mythology, Momus was the son of Nox, and god of mockery and ridicule. He delighted to rail at the actions of men and gods, sparing no one except Aphrodite, in whom he could find nothing to criticize, and in consequence vexed himself to death.
