Hard to Find Meaning in Noise of Insects

The plaintive love-song of the cricket, and all the other insect sounds that are heard on a summer night may have no meaning at all to the insects themselves.

Judged by human ears, the best insect music of today belong to rather primitive orders. The more advanced groups, such as ants, beetles, flies and butterflies, make no sounds that we can hear, or else, at most, only sounds that seem to us to be nothing more than faint squeaks, buzzes, hums, or clicks.
