## OLD MYSTERY IS REVIVED

\$1,000 REWARD POSTED IN BELDING BANK FOR MURDER 21 YEARS AGO.

Belding, Sept. 18.—General interest in a 21-year-old unsolved murder mystery was aroused here Thursday when W. L. Shipman of Belding posted a reward of \$1,000 in one of the local banks, for the apprehension of William Zeigler, 46, former Belding man, in connection with Groton, S. D., 21 years ago.

Zeigler, a former employe of Shipman, left Belding 25 years ago and went to the South Dakota village to work. While there, according to Shipman, he met and worked with a man named Belby. Belby, expecting to go to California, went to the bank on Saturday and drew out \$400, all the money he had.

On Sunday evening, so it is said, Belby and Zeigler went to an ice cream social. On the way home he was murdered and his body thrown into a well. He was shot and the money was missing when the body was recovered the next morning. Shipman has been told that Zeigler was seen leaving the ice cream social with Belby and could not be located following the murder. A warrant charging him with murder was issued at the time and close watch was kept in Michigan as it was believed he might come back to his former home.

He was located after the murder in northern Michigan and came near capture, but eluded a sheriff's posse in the woods. He has not been seen since. The reward has been offered by Shipman at the request of Belby's son in the hope that after a lapse of 21 years the mystery finally can be solved.—Grand Rapids, Press.

## BURGLAR HERE LAST NIGHT

RUNCIMAN ELEVATOR, ROBBED, LUMBER CO., PECKHAM FURNITURE OFFICES BROKEN INTO

Three Lowell business places were visited last night or this Thursday morning by burglars; but only at Runciman's elevator office was any cash or other valuables secured. There the loot was \$138.20, an unusually small amount for that office.

The Dessert & Brown Lumber Co. and Peckham Furniture Co. office were visited but nothing was taken as so far discovered.

At the Runciman office the safe was broken into and cash taken, checks left and all drawers ransacked and papers scattered about the office. Escape was made by a side basement window adjoining the railroad yard.

The Lumber Co safe was damaged by attempts to break it open; probably \$150 will cover the expense of opening it and making repairs.

No great damage was suffered at the Furniture Co. office, a window broken in and Miss Meek's plants tumbled on the floor. An unlocked safe used mostly for keeping of books and records was opened and papers scattered on the floor. The warehouse door had been broken into and a sledge hammer taken.

This was left on the office desk—the burglars evidently having been scared away before an assault could be made on the other safe.
