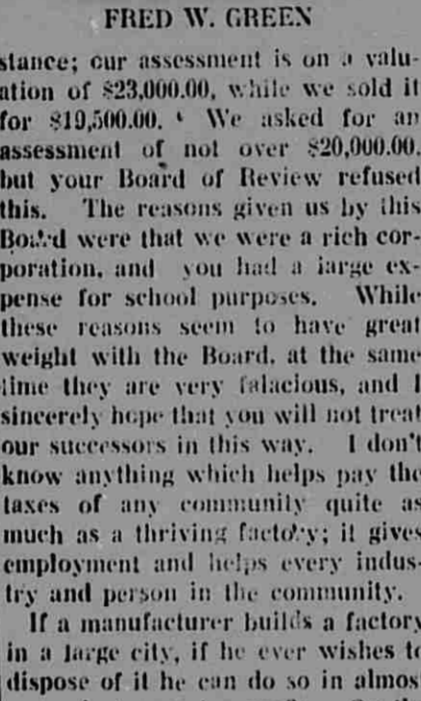

 I am pleased to tell you that we have been able to dispose of our factory at Lowell and are hoping for your good town a successful manufacturing enterprise. Let me offer to you this little bit of advice that I am giving with no personal feeling whatever, but for the good of your community.



When it comes tax time, do not assess the newcomers unjustly the way you did our firm. For instance, our assessment is on a valuation of \$23,000.00, while we sold it for \$19,500.00. We asked for an assessment of not over \$20,000.00, but your Board of Review refused this. The reasons given us by this Board were that we were a rich corporation, and you had a large expense for school purposes. While these reasons seem to have great weight with the Board, at the same time they are very fallacious, and I sincerely hope that you will not treat our successors in this way. I don't know anything which helps pay the taxes of any community quite as much as a thriving factory; it gives employment and helps every industry and person in the community.

If a manufacturer builds a factory in a large city, if he ever wishes to dispose of it he can do so in almost every instance at a profit. On the other hand, if a manufacturer builds a factory in a small town, like Ionia for instance, if he ever wants to sell it, he must sacrifice to do so. It would seem that this fact should be taken into consideration by your assessing officers. There is hardly a town in Michigan that would not be willing to exempt a firm from taxes for a considerable period of years for the benefit the town would receive by reason of the building of the factory. I believe the attitude of your assessing officers toward manufacturing enterprises is entirely out of step with the general thought on this subject.

I am not writing this, old friend, in a critical spirit because I have nothing but the kindest feelings for your town, and it has been a matter of regret with me that we could not see things differently and stay with you. Personally, I like Lowell, and while we have been in business there we have contributed when called upon both financially and by personal service to every public enterprise—we tried to be good loyal citizens.

SUPERIOR FURNITURE CO. COMES TO LOWELL. BUYS YPSILANTI-REED PLANT

COMPANY EMPLOYING ABOUT FIFTY MEN TO BEGIN OPERATIONS HERE DECEMBER 1.

LOWELL WORKMEN PREFERRED. REFITTING OF DRY KILN NOW UNDER WAY. COUNCIL MAKES GOOD. WILL POWER OFFERING

The Superior Furniture company of Grand Rapids has bought the Lowell property of the Ypsilanti Reed Furniture company and has already begun fitting the property for its use, the first act being the taking down of the "For Sale" sign that has "graced" its front for several months.

In an interview granted The Ledger at its office Tuesday, Secretary Higgins stated that the necessary machinery has been purchased and that work of installing same would begin at once.

It is expected that the Lowell factory will begin operations in part by December first, gradually increasing the same until the first of January when it is planned to have the factory in complete running order.

Forty-five men are now employed in the Grand Rapids factory and as many or more will be employed here. Aside from a dozen pivotal men, expert machinists and skilled furniture workers who will be brought here from Grand Rapids, Lowell workmen will be given the preference.

It is not the policy of the Superior Furniture company to bring in cheap foreign workmen. Experienced machine men and furniture workers and some common labor will be needed and a square deal will be given to men who will give an honest day's work for an honest day's pay. Those who own their own homes or will acquire homes here, preferred.

We infer from Mr. Higgins' remarks that cordial and friendly relations exist between the officers and workmen of the company, at the Grand Rapids factory, which began operations in a small way six years ago, making high-grade office chairs, and high-grade living room and novelty tables in solid mahogany and black walnut, until now its product is sold in the best furniture stores throughout the country and expansion has become necessary.

Work will continue at the Grand Rapids factory for a time at least and it is expected that further expansion of the Lowell factory will be required in the near future.

The officers of the company are: Harry Widdicombe, president. C. N. Adams, vice president. Anthony Disk, treasurer and superintendent.
 E. B. Higgins, secretary and general manager.

The company is incorporated under Michigan laws, with home office in Grand Rapids.

John Roughley and assistants are taking out the old equipment in the dry kiln preparatory to installing a new and up-to-date outfit. Rails from the Pere Marquette side tracks will be laid to the factory and lumber sheds will be built to cover them.

Mr. Higgins expressed himself as well pleased with the reception and prospects of his company in Lowell and expects to make his home here as soon as the necessary arrangements can be made.

Mrs. Higgins and four little Higgins youngsters accompanied him on his Lowell visit Tuesday and were domiciled for the day with Secretary E. B. Higgins of the Lowell Board of Trade, and Mrs. Kniffin at prominent Point. The mothers of Mr. and Mrs. Higgins were also of the party.

It is pleasing to add that the Lowell Village council appreciative of the fact that the Superior Furniture Company comes to Lowell buying its own property with its own money and asking no favors, offers the company through Village President O. J. Vetter a gift \$500 worth of power as a good will send-off.

Applications for employment by machinists, furniture and cabinet makers and finishers can be made with Secretary Kniffin of the Lowell Board of Trade or with Mr. Roughley at the factory.

F. A. GOULD BUYS DRAPER GARAGE

Draper garage property occupied by Earl Hunter's Star garage business and will occupy the same for his own show room and garage business as soon as Mr. Hunter can vacate and desired alterations can be made. He has also acquired other land adjacent to the buildings.
