GEO. CRUMP 96 IS DEAD HERE

CIVIL WAR VETERAN PASSED AWAY WEDNESDAY MORNING. FUNERAL FRIDAY AFTERNOON

George Crump died at his home in Lowell Wednesday at one o'clock, a. m., aged nearly 96 years.

Funeral services will be held at the Methodist church Friday afternoon, burial in Grand Rapids.

Mr. Crump was a Civil War veteran and one of the oldest men in Kent county. He was a member of the Methodist church and a regular attendant as long as he was able to walk there from his home on the West side and continued to attend as frequently as friends gave him conveyance and his health permitted.

He is survived by his wife and several children by a former marriage, who live in Grand Rapids.

He had lived in Lowell for many years and had he lived until next March would have reached his 96th milestone.

MRS. JOEL GILBERT BURIED TODAY

Mrs. Elsie Gilbert, widow of the late Joel Gilbert, died Tuesday night at the home of her sister at Leslie, Mich., aged nearly 67 years. Funeral services will be held today (Thursday) at 2 o'clock, p. m., at the home of her sister, Mrs. Loyal Taylor, Rev. A. J. Blair officiating clergyman; burial in South Boston cemetery.

Mr. and Mrs. Gilbert were well-known former old residents of Boston township, removing in recent years to a home on Monroe avenue in Lowell, where Mr. Gilbert died in April, 1924.

Mrs. Gilbert was for years an active member of the Clover Leaf club, retaining her interest in the same until declining health and the death of her husband broke up her home, since which time she has lived with relatives, most of the time at the Taylor home.

Mr. and Mrs. Gilbert, during their long residence in South Boston were interested members of the Grange and active in all things for the promotion of the welfare of the community and were affiliated with the Congregational church. Their Lowell neighbors have only kindly recollections of them and regret the departure of a good man and woman.

PAVE M-21 IONIA-LOWELL IN 1926

President Lewis H. Hale of the Ionia Chamber of Commerce, in an address before that body Monday evening, said that the Chamber had received almost positive assurance that M-21 will be paved from Ionia to Lowell next year. Of the relocation of M-16, Mr. Hale said that the activities of the Chamber of Commerce in that regard had saved the taxpayers of Ionia county \$250,000, it being necessary to pay for only four and one-half miles of pavement, while under the old law the county would have had to pay for 24 miles.

PAROLED PRISONER

RETURNS UNDER ALIAS Ionia, Mich., Nov. 6.—Fred Clark, 30 years old, sentenced to the Ionia reformatory on May 18, 1924, from Chippewa county, for one and a half to five years, and who was paroled from the institution on December 15, 1915, and never heard from, has been returned under the name of Bert Rice, of Genesee a term of 3 to 10 years. He will have to serve the remainder of his first sentence and then start the new, according to reformatory officials.—Detroit Free Press.

Trace Term "Mugwump" to Algonquin Indians

The first general use of the term "mugwump," as applied to a deserter from a political party, was during the Presidential campaign of 1854.

On June 15 of that year a newspaper in New York referred to the independent Republicans who had deserted from the Democrats as "mugwumps," and the word was immediately taken up all over the United States as a fit appellation for the disaffected Republicans calling themselves "Independents."

The word is supposed to be of Algonquin origin and was used by the Connecticut Indians as a synonym for captain, leader or superior person. In the modern political meaning it is applied satirically to those who consider themselves superior to their former partisan associates.

The word was incorporated into the American language long before it obtained its modern political significance, being often used in New England and the Middle West as a synonym for dude, pharisee, etc.—Chicago Journal.

Historic Islands

Bedloe's Island, on which the Statue of Liberty stands, was ceded to the United States government for the purpose of harbor defense and it was occupied by Fort Wood.
