
IVE INDICTED FOR \$7,000,000 U. S. FRAUD

Col. T. W. Miller, Former Alien Property Custodian, Held for Trial.

New York .- Col. Thomas W. Willer, rmer alien property custodian, four erman and Swiss citizens and three rman and Swiss corporations were indicted by a special federal grand jury on charges of conspiracy to defraud the United States government. The ind-ctment involves the release by the custodian of about \$7,000,000 of sequestered assets of the American Metal company, representing the sale of a 49 per cent alleged enemy interest o pretended Swiss owners.



Upon Paul's arrival at Jerusalem esentatives of the church there ave him a most cordial reception. In rder that the brethren in Jerusalen night graciously receive him, it was proposed to him by the elders that he take a Jewish vow to prove that he was in no way opposed to the law. The effort was to remove prejudice. they recognized that such an act would in no way compromise or in-volve the Gentile brethren. Furthermore this would not compromise his own principles of action, viz., to the Jews he became a Jew, and to the entiles, a Gentile; all things to all men in order to gain them for Christ. II. Paul's Arrest (21:27-40).

How far this act conciliated th Jews we are not told, but it only enaged the unbelieving Jews, causing hem to resort to mob law. These maddened Jews on the basis of a sup position seized him and dragged him not being able to get any information rom the howling mob, bound Paul and started for the castle. In order to zy of the mob, the soldiers lifted him upon their shoulders and bore him up the stairs. Paul kept himself under ontrol, and politely asked permission of the captain to speak to the people. When he addressed him in Greek and quoted his Roman citizenship, the cap-


