\$10 WORTH OF STOCKINGS FOR \$1.00 IS THE BAIT FOR MRS. DOE

Reported that the chain-coupon plan of selling stockings is being worked in this vicinity the bait offfered by the agent is "Ten dollars worth of hosiery for one dollar." The scheme is declared to be unlawful and some one is bound to get

This is how it works: Mrs. John Doe purchases a coupon for \$1.00. She then sends \$3.00 to the company and receives three coupons which she is to sell to her friends at \$1.00 each. Each of these three friends forwards \$3.00 to the company for three coupons, and then the company ships the stockings to Mrs. Doe. The company has received \$13 for each \$10 worth of stockings sold and all along the chain each woman who buys stockings pays \$4.00 while her friends pay \$9.00 more before she can get the stockings she has

The whole scheme is declared to be a fraud and a swindle as the chain is bound to break sooner or later and thousands of dollars will be lost when the coupons are not re-
