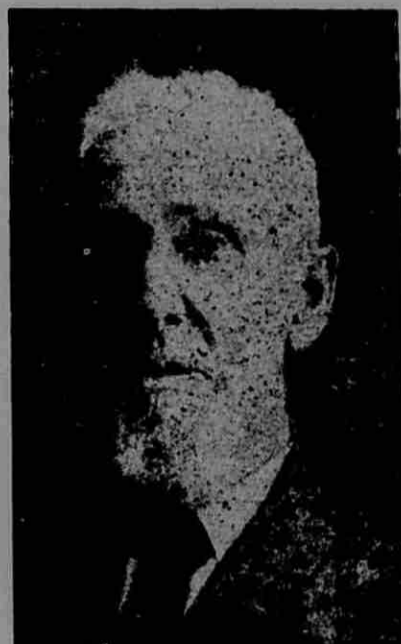

SIMON PETTIT LAID TO REST

LOWELL'S OLDEST CITIZEN GIVEN CHRISTIAN, MASONIC, MILITARY BURIAL AT OAKWOOD

Simon Pettit, whose illness was recorded in our last issue, passed away at his home in this village Saturday night in his ninety-sixth year. Funeral services were held at the Methodist church Tuesday afternoon at 2 o'clock, Rev. L. H. Nixon officiating. Burial at Oakwood cemetery by the Masonic fraternity, assisted by a guard of honor of the American Legion.

Pastor Nixon in his funeral address incorporated the following: The funeral service marks the passing from our midst of a distinguished Christian gentleman. The birth of Simon Pettit, May 30, 1830, in Yates, Orleans county, New York, was followed by 23 years of residence in that community from whence he came to Michigan, where in the good providence of God he lived for seventy-two years.

Before the Civil war he was engaged as a grain cradle maker.

As a soldier of the union he served his country for three years as first sergeant of Company L of 26th Michigan Infantry. He was wounded in the skirmish at Mine Run in 1863. He had the distinction of being the second oldest soldier to attend the Grand Army encampment in September in Grand Rapids.

With the exception of 10 years spent in Grand Rapids he spent the majority of his years at the war, until his retirement in Lowell, 15 years ago, on the farm purchased by him at the close of the war.

He had the further distinction of being the only surviving charity lodge. He was reputed to be the oldest member of the Masonic order in the state and was highly regarded and affectionately attended by his fraternal brothers. His fraternal relations were established after a long trip on horseback to Sturgis in 1854.

He distinguished himself and the church by a long, consistent and devoted attendance upon its services. When 40 years of age he came under the ministry of a Rev. M. Pierce in the second street Methodist Church in Grand Rapids. At that time he was converted and joined that church. When he moved to Lowell he brought his membership to this communion.

His wife preceded him to rest 12 years ago. He is survived by Mrs. Ava Wardell of Lowell, Mrs. Nellie Huffard, Grand Rapids, daughters, and four grandchildren, Claud S. Wardell, Earl P. Wardell, L. F. Wardell all of Grand Rapids and Maybell Kinsley of Chicago.

NEW SAFETY BODY IS FORMED FRIDAY

Lowell Man Named Head of Central Western Michigan Council

M. N. Henry of Lowell, Friday, was elected president of the Central Western Michigan Safety council, an organization eventually to include some 50 communities linked as a unit to push safety measures. The council is directly affiliated with the National Safety council and is sponsored by the city branch of that organization. Election and formal organization took place in the Association of Commerce dining rooms.

Towns which have pledged or raised their quotas toward the \$5,000 needed for a proposed safety campaign are Grand Haven, Holland, Zeeland, Lowell, Sparta, Ravenna, Cedar Springs and South Haven. Other cities and towns have given assurance they will support the organization.

Officers Are Elected. Besides President Henry, officers are: First vice president, John Schouten, Holland; second vice president, J. B. Haskins, Howland City; treasurer, Morton H. Luce, Spring Lake, and temporary secretary, John R. Brownell, secretary of the Grand Rapids Safety council. Headquarters will be in Mr. Brownell's offices in Association of Commerce building.

The purposes of the organization are to put on a safety campaign, to act as a clearing center for all accident statistics and to aid each individual village to solve its problems of safety.

These particular children are all especially worthy of help. Many of them have neither father nor mother and some do not have any near relatives; some are crippled and badly need things that a few dollars can buy to make them happy.

The Michigan Children's Aid Society will write a letter of appreciation to all givers. Donors are requested to make checks payable to the order of the Society and those who prefer can send them direct to the Society, Box 284, Lansing.

It is hoped that churches, Sunday school classes, schools and fraternal organizations will recognize the pressing need of these homeless children and contribute to make their Christmas happier and more cheerful.

BILL BOARDS IN THE WAY

SUPERIOR FURNITURE COMPANY NEEDS BILL BOARD SPACE FOR PARKING PURPOSES

Work on the Superior Furniture company's Lowell plant is progressing so rapidly as the season permits. Elevated package for lumber cars to and through the dry kilns have been constructed and enclosing of the new building is about completed. Laying of the brick veneer walls began Tuesday and a carload of black walnut lumber has been received and has been placed in the dry kiln.

Machinery and equipment is beginning to arrive and will continue to come until the entire plant is equipped to begin manufacturing operations early in January.

Last week the bill boards fronting the company's vacant lots were torn down and it was explained that the space is needed for parking purposes by the company's workmen, which is a good reason, as far as it goes, but between you and us and the gate post, it wouldn't surprise us a bit to see another building duplicate No. 1, going up there sometime.

Secretary Higgins and Superintendent Disk of the Grand Rapids factory are in touch with the progress of the work here, visiting the Lowell plant almost daily and John Roughley who has charge of the construction work of the new building has installed a telephone in his home—No. 333, if you want to reach him; but don't talk too long as he is as busy as fleas on a dog's back.
