The smoke rolls upward exactly as it would do in nature, now whirling in mad spirals, now floating serenely. Only the heat and crackle of flames are wanting to make the illusion perfect. Report of East Kent co-operating cow testing association for month ending Feb. 23, 1926. There were 19 herd tested; 196 cows tested and... dry cows; 6 new cows were entered and 6 grade and 7 pure bred sold for beef. 17 produced from 40 to 50 lbs. fat; 11 above 50 lbs.; 18 produced from 1,000 to 1,250 of milk and 17 about 1,250. Paul Wittenbach had high herd with an average of 42.6 of fat, 808 of milk; he has 8 grade and pure bred Jerseys. Maryland farm was owner of cow having highest butter fat production, was a P. B. Holstein and produced 631 of fat and 1,856 of milk. The association average was 55.5 milk and 22.7 fat. Maryland farms had high and second high 2 year olds. Maryland farm had 1st, 2nd, and 3rd year olds. Maryland farms had high 4 year old and Maryland farms had 2nd and 3rd. Maryland farms had 3 highest fat producers in entire class and also of milk class.
