CHAIRS-TABLES IN 7,000 LOTS

WHEELS ARE TURNING AT SUPERIOR FURNITURE FACTORY, MACHINERY NEARLY ALL IN.

The Superior Furniture company started Monday on a run of 7,000 chairs and an equal number of tables, and the end of its tedious setting and installing of machinery is in sight. One or two machines that are in are still to be put in operation and one or two more are yet to arrive.

When all is in readiness and operation, the members of the Lowell Board of Trade will be invited to inspect the new factory.

The company has already employed several Lowell men and will take on others as fast as openings for men suitable to the jobs appear. Secretary Higgins informs us that, according to present outlook, when the factory is running full blast, a force of seventy-five men will be employed. A bus-load of workmen are still being transported night and morning between here and Grand Rapids, not yet having found houses or accommodations here for their families. Those having houses, rooms and board for these desirable people should make ready and leave applications with Secretary Kniffin of the Lowell Board of Trade at his office in the King block.

It is expected that some good new houses will have to be built in the Spring before all wants are satisfied. In the mean time The Ledger would advise prospective citizens that desirable homes can be bought here for much less than the cost of building same and counsels an investigation of such opportunities. They will find, we think, that in Lowell, at present, it is cheaper to buy than to rent or build.

DOINGS OF THE LOWELL SCHOOLS

After winning the first two rounds of the sectional tournament, defeating Rockford and Ottawa Hills, the Lowell boys lost the final game to Grandville by a 15-10 score. With the score tied practically all the game, Lowell saw victory vanish as Grandville caged a free throw a few seconds before the final whistle, thus giving them the sectional championship and tournament cup. Being runner-up Lowell, however, will have another chance in the regional tournament to be held at the same school this week, Thursday, Friday and Saturday, when Lowell and Grandville will meet in the first round at 8 o'clock Thursday night.

Grandville high annexed their second county championship of the Lowell section in the final game at the Y. W. C. A. Saturday afternoon. This is the first time in five successive years that Lowell has failed to take both county championships titles. Full credit must be given to both the Grandville aggregations for having the best teams in the history of their school and both deserved the honors because of their playing abilities.

DAM BUILDERS AWARDED NEW BRIDGE CONTRACT

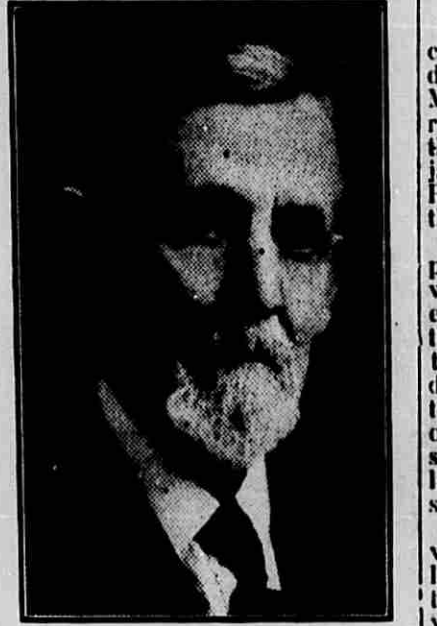

COMMITTEE IS FOR BUILDING

NEW DETENTION HOSPITAL AND COUNTY JAIL COMBINED, AS ECONOMY MEASURE ADVISED.

Mr. President and Members of the Lowell Board of Trade:—
The undersigned members of a committee, appointed at the Noon-day Luncheon meeting of Monday, March 1, 1926, with instructions to report upon conditions surrounding the Detention hospital and county jail located in the city of Grand Rapids, Michigan, desire to submit the following report:

Our visit to the Detention hospital, while being no pleasure trip was interesting and instructive. The exterior as well as the interior of this building are anything but what they should be for the accommodation of those unfortunate enough to become inmates. An old, worn out edifice, with narrow halls and stairways, poorly lighted and what is without the conveniences necessary to cleanliness and sanitation.

With practically nothing to do with, however, we must congratulate the person in charge of this institution upon the existing order in which the interior of the building is kept.

At the county jail we were accorded every attention, nothing of the good, bad, or indifferent was hidden from our eyes, and our questions honestly and cheerfully answered.

This building is fifty-six years old and to our mind has served its purpose well.

The building has been condemned and can not be enlarged. Crowded as it becomes at times, the accommodations are not sufficient to properly handle the prisoners. It is just a jail, and as such, may be all that is required, though unsafe, unsanitary and impregnated with an odor that defies the unlimited use of soap, water or any known germicide which we must admit are used most extensively by the present caretakers.

As a public building the exterior does not add anything to the beauty of the city of Grand Rapids, and we all agree that there is an immediate need for a Detention hospital, different from what is now being used, and of a different county jail in the near future.

The constructing of both at the same time, according to the plan now being considered by the Board of Supervisors, would be ultimate economy.

We submit this report unbiased by any motive but that of serving you, and request that we may be discharged.
