EGHTY-SIX YEARS AGO. Letter from B. Robinson to Timothy White, addressed to the latter at Boston, Iowa county, Michigan, Saranac post-office. Grand Rapids, July 10, 1840. Dear Sir: Your favor dated 27th June last was received some days since, but owing to the pressure of business I have not found time to reply until the present. With regard to the land at or near Saranac I should be glad to have you confer with Dr. Eastman and get his terms before I should be disposed to make any alteration on the price which I proposed to you at my house. If, however, you and Dr. Eastman should be able to agree, I will try hard not to be the means of preventing a bargain, the other two lots you speak of near Flat river you may have at \$5.00 per acre; cash down. You have no doubt examined them, consequently, I need not say anything about the quality of them, the land is itself very good to recommend itself, and the situation as to roads, a neighborhood for a school, etc., is not excelled in a new country like ours. The fractions lying between those lots and Grand river were owned by Dr. Denton, of Ann Arbor, Washenaw county, whether he still owns them or not is more than I can say. Dr. Eastman is at the mouth of Grand river with whom you can easily communicate by letter and learn his price of the lands at Saranac. Respectfully Yours, B. Robinson.

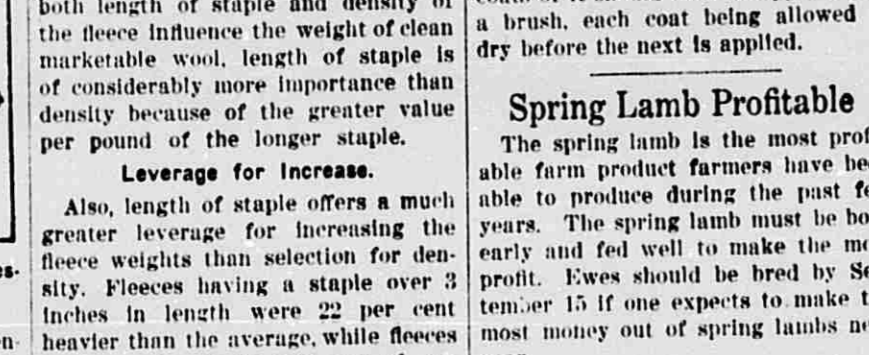

Greater Length of Wool Staple

Possibilities of Increasing Average Pleece Weight by New Method.

Profitable production depends to a considerable extent on the weight of fleeces. A century ago the average annual fleece weight for wool in the United States was less than two pounds, but there has been a gradual increase since that time. The average American sheep until now the annual average of about seven and one-half pounds.
