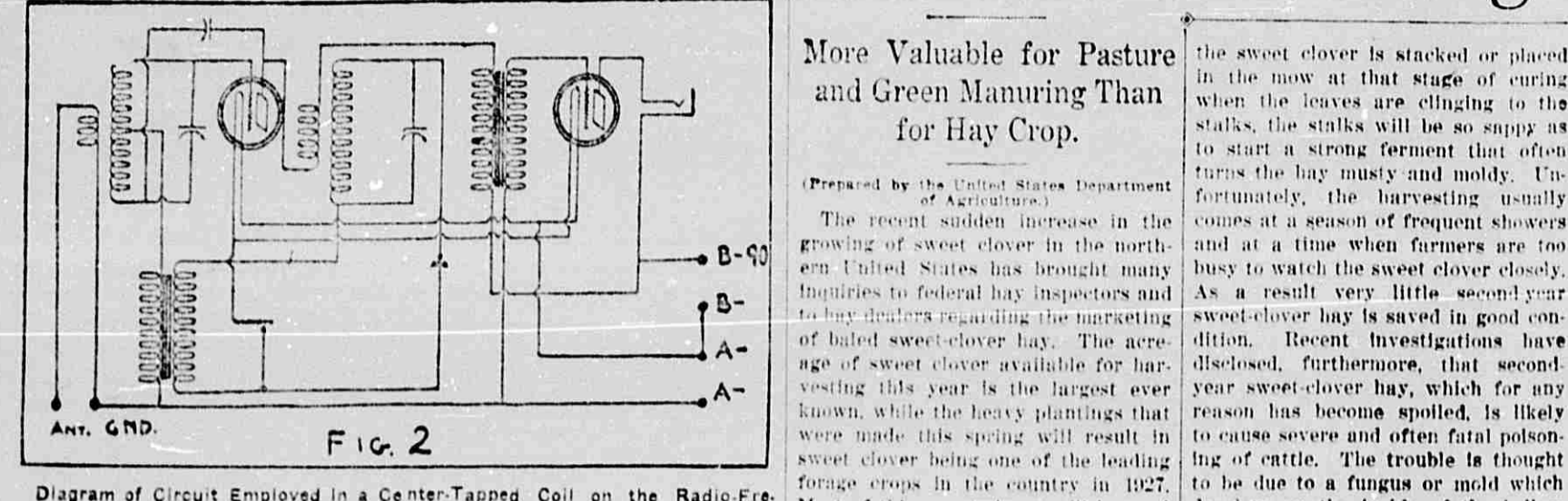

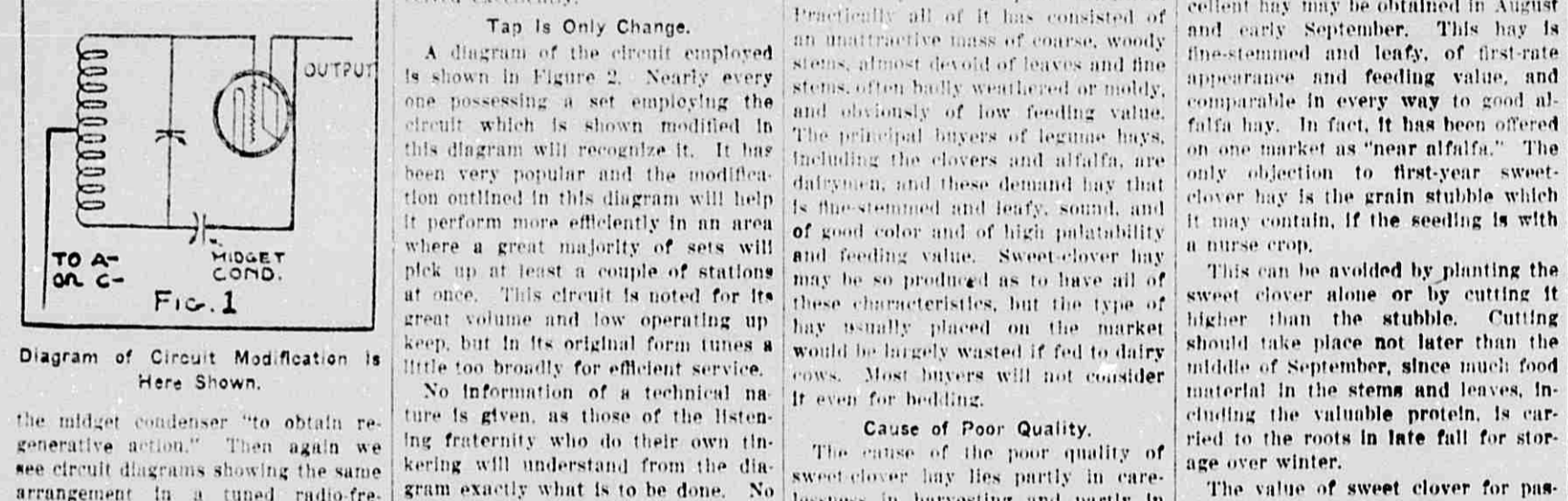
### Sweet Clover Is Best for Forage

**Some Visible Signs of Binder Troubles Outlined by Experts**

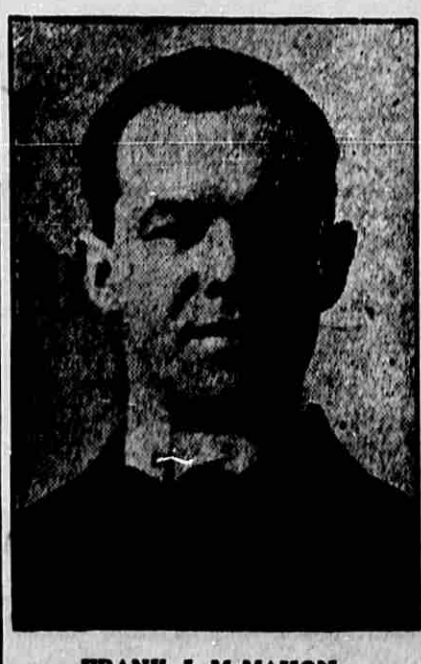
