SCHOOL DAY A TOP NOTCHER

For former Lowell school boys and girls from a half century ago down the middle-aged and fathers and mothers of later years and those of more recent vester years, School day, Tuesday, August 2, was the chief attraction, and it was certainly an occasion to warm the hearts of those who look back fondly upon the by-gone school days.

The picnic dinner at Island park was happily featured by the participation of the Auld Lang Syne club of Grand Rapids, an organization of old Lowell people of former years, who loyally remember the old town, the old days, and the old friends, about forty registering.

After community singing led by Harley Maynard, F. W. Hine, presiding, called upon Mrs. A. C. Sherman, who responded with a talk of inspiring days, showing a vigor surprising for her good age.

A ball game between the Old Timers and a team of Youngsters held an interested crowd in the afternoon, the boys winning by a score of 11 to 0. Jim McMahon in the box did a good job for the veterans and had the kids guessing.

The evening reunion at the High school was a scream and a heart-string event from beginning to end.
