SCHOOL BEGINS MONDAY, AUG. 30

The Lowell schools will be open on Monday, August 30. There will be a meeting for the teachers in the morning at nine o'clock and the teachers will be ready for the enrollment and classification of children at one o'clock in the afternoon. Children who do not come Monday afternoon will be called absent. Superintendent W. W. Gumsier will be in his office August 26, 27, and 28, to adjust any matters that might come to his attention. Patrons are asked to come on these three days who have any matters that need to be straightened out. It is expected that there will be regular sessions beginning Tuesday morning. There will be no great changes in the courses of study. Children who will enter the high school for the first time should consult their parents as to which course they should pursue. LOWELL GETS BIG CONTRACT

BROWN & SON, SEEDSMEN, CONTRACT HAND-PICKING MILLION POUNDS OF PEAS TO RUNCIMAN.

Seedsmen A. J. Brown & Son Inc., of Grand Rapids, have let a contract to C. E. Runciman, of Lowell, to hand-pick 1,000,000 pounds of peas in addition to 1,000,000 pounds of beans and corn, sweet corn and garden seeds, all to be shipped from Lowell.

In addition to the Runciman elevator the Thomas elevator and the adjacent Chase factory building will be used during the Fall and Winter and a force of sixty girls and women will be employed.

Work on the new deal begins in about two weeks, early September. The new office building will be rushed to completion, clearing the whole of the Runciman elevator building for the new enterprise. The work of hand-picking the million pounds of peas will be done on an hourly basis, while the bean work will continue on the present basis.

Mr. Runciman is to be congratulated upon bringing his own plant to Lowell, which will mean much for the welfare of many families and for the prosperity of the community in general.

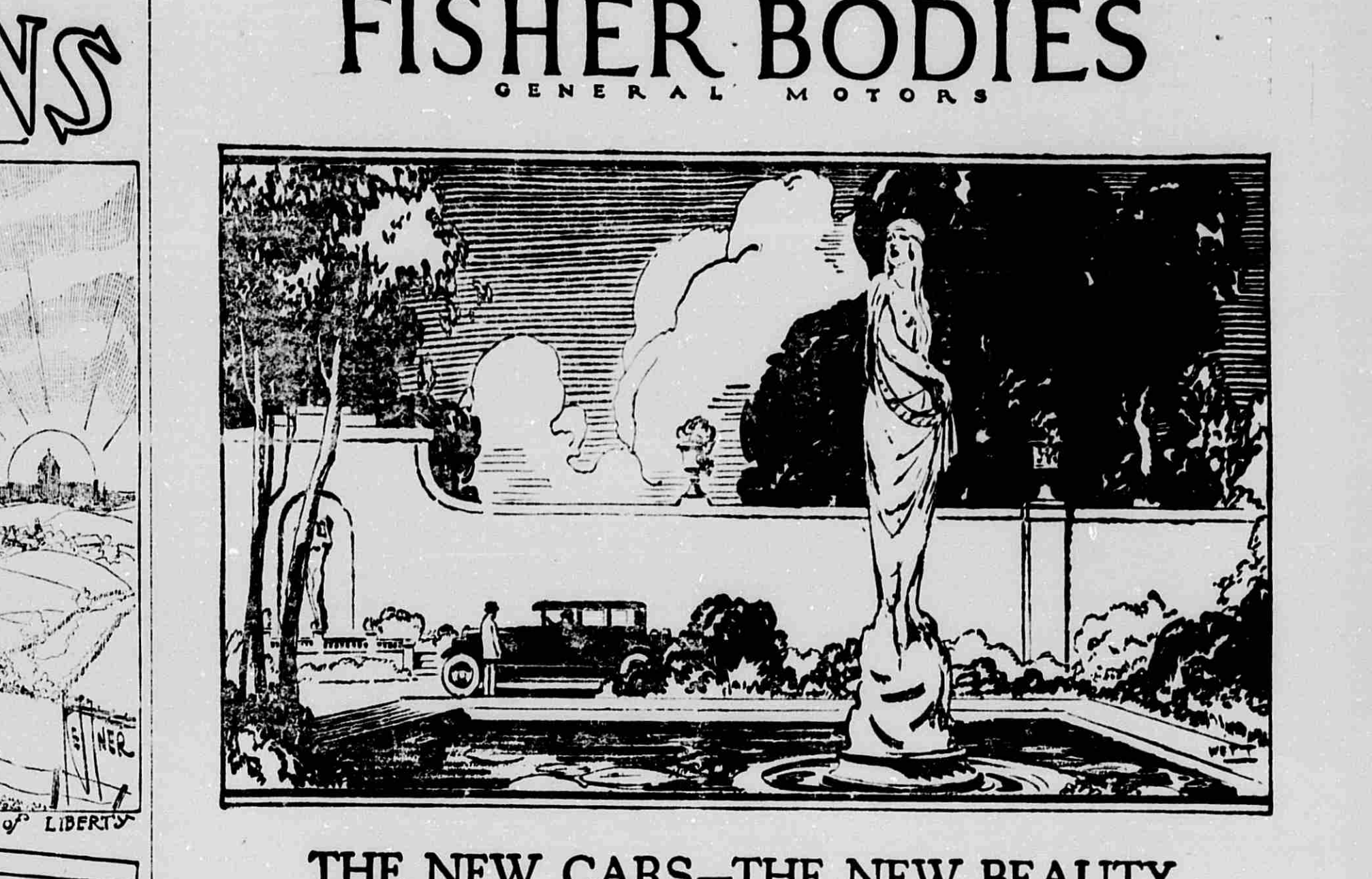

HORTICULTURE AT STATE FAIR

INFERIOR VARIETIES CUT FROM LISTS AND PREMIUMS ADDED TO STANDARD FRUITS FOR DETROIT SHOW.

Detroit, Aug. 18.—Michigan's horticultural interests will have revised and strengthened premium classes in the competition events at the State fair, September 5 to 11. New appointments of the \$3,000 premiums in the fruit section is expected by horticultural authorities to result in a better balanced show than has been possible in the past.

Many of the old unimportant fruit varieties have been eliminated for this year's lists, with the premium money thus released added to the awards in the more standard varieties. This general change was made at the request of the State Horticultural society, in order to emphasize the best commercial fruits for Michigan.

Fruit classes, as they have recently been finally set for the 1926 fair, include plate entries for apples, pears, peaches, plums, and grapes, with prizes of five, three and two dollars in most varieties. Exhibition tray classes include apples and pears with prizes carrying seven dollars for first place, and five, three, and one for the other places.

Retail market of roadside stand displays in first place. County exhibits from individuals or organizations will compete for more than \$1,000 of prize money, \$400 being up for first in this important class.

An Upper Peninsula class, special sweepstakes in different sections, basket classes for grapes, and other premium sections are included in the revised list, which is attracting the interest of fruit men all over the state.
