P. M. ENGINEER DIES ON TRACK

JAMES JOHNSON, PERE MARQUETTE OFFICIAL KILLED IN COLLISION NEAR MOSELEY.

Division Engineer James Johnson was instantly killed on the Pere Marquette track about two miles west of Moseley at 10:30 a. m. Wednesday, when the inspection car in which he was riding collided head on with a freight train.

Road Master, Charles Cole, of Edmore, and Section Master, A. Showers, of Belding, were on the inspection car with Mr. Johnson, but jumped and escaped serious injury.

The body was brought to Yeiter's chapel, where Acting Coroner Springer conducted an examination and decided that the death was accidental.

The freight train was coming west and the inspection car was going east to Moseley to meet the passenger train. There is a sharp curve on the track, where the collision took place, preventing a long view of the track, and it is supposed Mr. Johnson having the passenger train in mind did not know about the freight.

Engineer Harrison, of the freight train, says he saw the inspection car jump and Johnson put his feet out as if starting to jump. It is thought that his heart failed him at the imminent danger and that he was incapable of jumping, as he sat as if bound. The inspecting car and freight were both running fast.

Mr. Johnson leaves a wife and a daughter of 12 years. The body was taken to his Saginaw home on a special train at 5 p. m. Wednesday.

FIRE EXPOSES BOWNE STILL

LOWELL DEPUTY SHERIFF FOUND TWELVE BARRELS OF MASH ON CAMPBELL LAKE FARM.

Deputy Sheriff Bowne was called to Campau lake Sunday morning because of a fire in a hog pen on the Fred Kreiser farm and resulting in exposure of a still. Twelve barrels of mash and other paraphernalia were disclosed in the ruins, but the coils and a 50-gallon still had been removed and were found in a swamp and elsewhere on the farm. The deputy ordered the parties concerned to appear at the Sheriff's office for examination.

It is supposed the fire was caused by the explosion of a gasoline stove used in the still.

No moonshine was found on the premises by the officer.

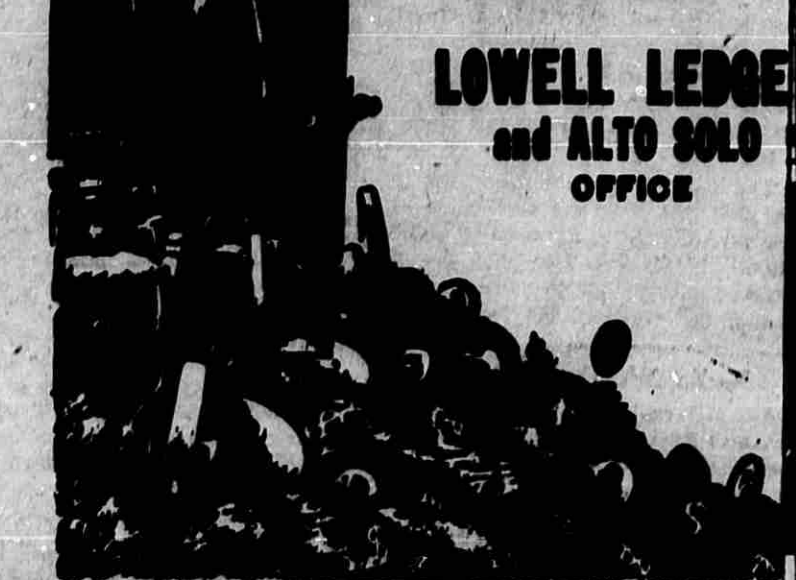
