ODD TRIANGLE JOINS IN S. A. HOSPITAL TO GIVE BABE A NAME Three Faiths Unite to Help

Right a Wrong. Grand Rapids, Mich. (Special) .-

How a girl's broken life was mended. a baby was given its father's name, love conquered shame and disgrace and Protestant, Catholic and Jew joined with the Salvation Army to help right a wrong, was related here by Major Elmer Johnson, who has reeral secretary of the western Michigan and northern Indiana evangelical and welfare activities of the Salvation Army with headquarters in Grand Rapids. "She was but sixteen, and one of

the almost four-thousand unwed mothers that last year found a refuge in their despair in one of our thirty-three Salvation Army Women's Homes and Hospitals located at strategic points of service throughout the United States," said the Major. "She came from a Protestant family of a small downstate town. The father of her child was a Jewish youth of about twenty years. "She became the mother of a baby

Nurturing it there in the hospital, she grew to love the little gieeful mite of humanity that bore no name but hers. But she feared to venture forth into a world that she knew would look upon her babe as the badge of her shame, "'What can I do with him? Where shall I go?' was the burden of sorrow,

she often voiced to the Adjutant Matron of the hospital. She did not realize that even before her baby was born, the great service machine of the Salvation Army had been set in motion in its efforts to restore order, if possible, in those human lives-to preserve that which was best in the three, for God and the social order. "The father of the baby had been located by army officers. He had been

induced of his own will to come to the hospital to see the mother of his

child and their little one. The Adju-

tant of that 'Home of the Hopeless' often had looked into human hearts. She spoke the language of this ageold tragedy. She knew that if conscience could be awakened and a heart could be toughed, that love and God would do the rest, regardless of race or creed. Before she had talked long with the youthful father, he was on his knees beside the Adjutant fight-ing it out with God and his conscience to find the way that love, duty and manhood would have him to go. Then he asked to see the young mother and her baby. No one knows but the two what was said as he talked long with her who had given life to the little one which lay in her arms. Later he kissed them both and rushed from the hospital, telling the Adjutant that he would return very soon. "His first step was to procure a

marriage license; his next at the office of the first Justice of the Peace that he could find. Then he returned to the hospital with both the justice and the license. And there in the Salvation Army 'Heartsense' Home with the Adjutant and her aides as witnesses, the little Protestant girl-mother was married to the Jewish young man by the Justice of the Peace who was a Roman Cathoile, and an all unknowing buby boy was given his father's name and protection."
