## HUNTER SHOOTS ALTON WOMAN

### WHEN DOG COLLIDES WITH CAR MRS. SUSAN BIERI WOUNDED IN ARM BY RABBIT SHOT.

Mrs. Susanna Bierl, of Alton vicinity, was shot in the arm by Ernest Gibbs, of Lowell, Sunday noon, while Mrs. Bierl and her son Carl were driving home from church in Lowell.

While passing the cemetery near Fox's Corners they met another car and in turning out to pass it a dog accompanying the other car ran into or under the Bierl car and howled as if hurt. Gibbs fired his rabbit-shooting gun into the windshield of the Bierl car, shattering the glass and hitting Mrs. Bierl in the arm.

Carl turned his car about and followed the hunters to Lowell and got their license number and then took his mother to Dr. Grefsdren, who probed for the shot and dressed the wounds, which were not considered serious, her heavy coat having saved her from worse injury.

Complaint having been made to Deputy Sheriff Speerstra, occupants of the hunting car were identified as Ernest Gibbs, and Peter Baker, of Lowell. Following consultation with Attorney Springuel who advised the Biers to prosecute, Mrs. Bierl, however, was anxious to keep out of court and refuses to prosecute. Gibbs protested that the shooting was unintentional or accidental—probably meaning unpremeditated—was anxious to settle. Mrs. Bierl was willing to accept a monetary settlement covering damage to car and payment of doctor's bill—nothing more, though Gibbs would have paid more to have escaped further responsibility.

The attorney informs that this settlement only satisfies the damages and does not settle the people's case which can still be prosecuted in their behalf.

### TWO ESCAPE DEATH IN CRASH NEAR BELDING.

Belding, Nov. 27.—Clair Ford and Dorus Church, of Moseley, had narrow escapes here late yesterday when the auto in which they were riding was demolished by a Pere Marquette passenger train as it was backing out of here on its way to Ionia. The crash occurred at Kidville, a mile north. Ford was only slightly injured by the impact which derailed the train, and pulled his companion from the wreckage. Church was severely cut about on the hand and the little finger was amputated in the hospital here Friday.—(Free Press.)

The wreckage of the car was taken to Gould's garage at Lowell, where the wonder was how either Ford or Church got out alive.

## ENRAGED FARMER SHOOTS, KILLS MAN.

### Attempted Raid on Chicken House.

Greenville, Nov. 25.—Edward Sixbury, 37, was shot and killed here Wednesday night and Wil Tepper, 25, is a prisoner in the county jail at Stanton as the result of shot-firing by L. J. Wilson, a farmer, residing two miles northeast of here, when he went to investigate a commotion near his chicken coop. Wilson was aroused about 11 o'clock by a disturbance among his chickens. Seizing his gun he made his way to the henhouse and surprised Sixbury and Tepper, who made an attempt to escape. Failing to halt on command, Wilson fired and Sixbury dropped.

Deputy Sheriff Walter Bopp was notified and made his way to the Wilson farm where Sixbury and Tepper were being held. Sixbury was taken to Greenville hospital, where he died three hours after the shooting. Tepper was taken to Stanton Thursday morning and lodged in the county jail there.

Investigation by Deputy Bopp leads him to believe there are three others mixed up in what he styles a chicken house raid. Sixbury's body has been taken to the R. A. Brown mortuary parlors. Coroner Charles King, Greenville, has since notified his intention of inquiring into a chicken house raid, which will convene sometime Friday. Sixbury leaves a wife and four children.—(Grand Rapids Press.)

## COMMITTEE SEES POWER SITES ON FLAT RIVER.

### Supervisors Committee Inspects Opportunities for Use of Vergennes.

Sites for a proposed hydro-electric plant on Flat river in Vergennes township were inspected Saturday by the committee on roads and bridges of the board of supervisors in anticipation of an application for rights to the board in its January session. The plant would serve villages and farms of the community with light and power.

The project was initiated by Supervisor M. B. McPherson but has been taken over by William G. Yates, it is said. Mr. Yates was responsible for the Cascade and Ada power dams on the Thornapple river.

According to Mr. McPherson a power plant is especially desirable for two school districts of the township which have a valuation so small they are constantly in financial straits.—(Grand Rapids Press.)

Dr. John A. May, 75, superintendent of schools in the seventies following the late S. P. Hicks, died at Miller sanitarium, Grand Rapids, Monday night. Funeral was held at the George W. One hundred and sixty of Lowell's staunch farmers attended the eighth annual banquet of the Lowell Live Stock association at the City hall Tuesday evening, Nov. 30, served by Ashby & Randall, new restaurateurs.

The following officers were elected: W. J. McCarthy, president; M. B. McPherson, vice president; C. H. Runciman, secretary-treasurer; O. J. Odell, auditor; E. Pinkney, Beuben Lee, Howard Bartlett, Chris. Kroff, directors.

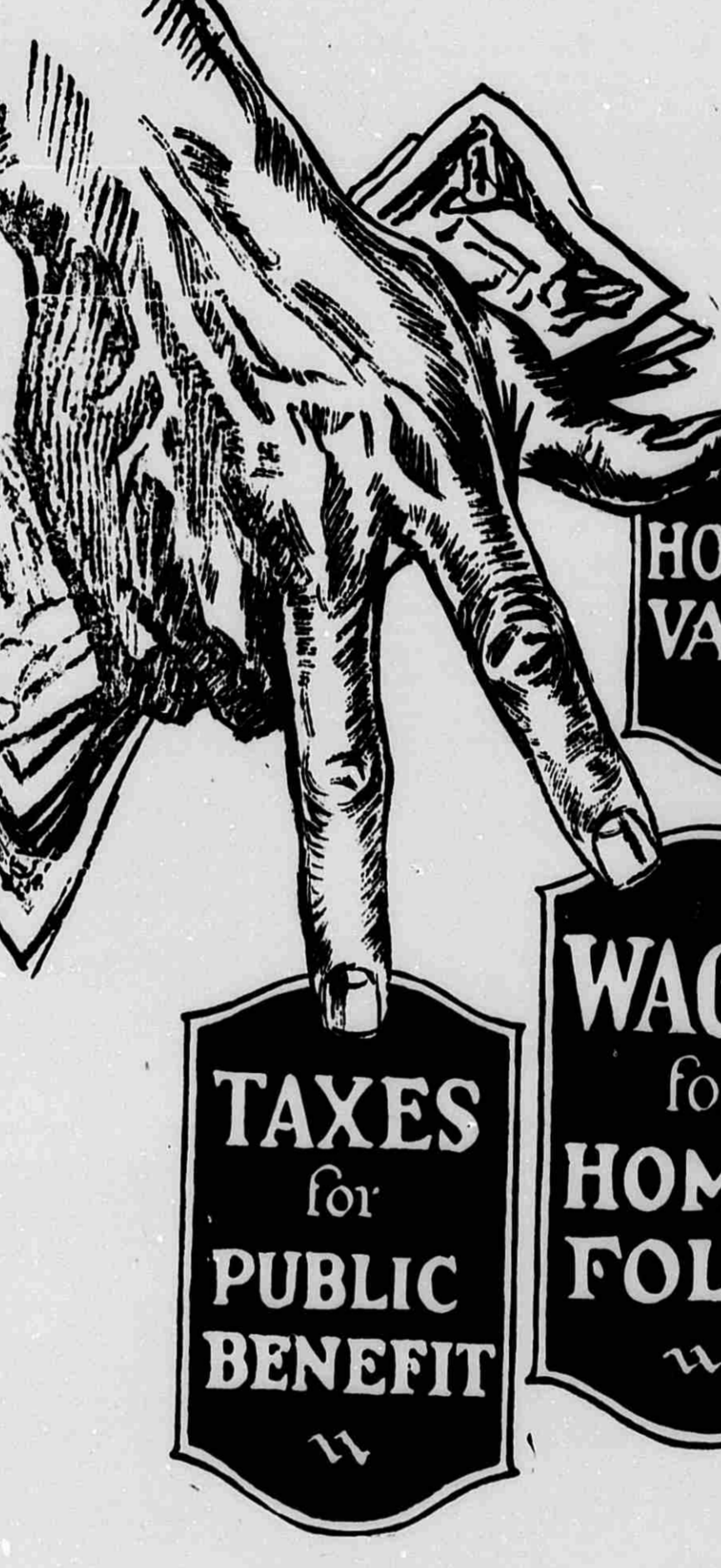
