### LONG THE WAY TO CANADA

Earl Nash writes of his drive to the land of flowers and "bonny breezes."

Lake Worth, Fla., Dec. 17, '26.

F. M. Johnson, Lowell, Mich., Dear Friend:

Thinking you and the home folks would like to hear from us in the Sunny South I will give you a short description of our trip.

We left on December 5th going by way of Battle Creek and Marshall on the Central route. There was fully six inches of snow in the morning when we started and it began snowing soon after leaving Marshall. On the way just south of Marshall the sun began to shine and rest of the day was bright and cheerful.

Snow fall beginning to wane near Indiana and Michigan State line. At State line about two inches, further on in Indiana about one inch.

At Van Wert where we stopped for the night the light snow fall was covered with ice from the sleet storm of the night before.

We left Van Wert on the 6th and had about sixty miles of slippery road. At Colina the road winds around the shore of Lake St. Mary's, which was frozen entirely over. The temperature was ten degrees below zero.

We crossed the river at Cincinnati to Covington, Ky.

The route from Covington through Kentucky is of much scenic beauty. It winds around the hills down into the valleys up around the hills to the divide, then along the summits until it takes another serpentine glide down into the valley. It sure is like the trail of a serpent but a beautiful drive.

The weather today was cloudy. We left Cincinnati on the 7th, temperature 30 degrees above zero. Saw a beautiful rainbow just after sunrise. Sun shining part of forenoon and nearly all the afternoon.

The route from Cincinnati goes through the beautiful Blue Grass region. Lexington is the metropolis and center of this region. Its racing meets, horse, auto and style shows, entertain people from all over the country. Greatest thoroughbred horse center in the world and one of the largest tobacco markets.

The route from Lexington on across the Kentucky river to Berea is slightly rolling. From Berea on to London it is very hilly. From London to Middlesborough rolling.

It goes over Gilliam and Big Log mountains.

Middlesborough at the foot of the Cumberland mountains is a mining town surprisingly modern and substantial. Within six miles are many soft mines and the former trade is large.

Here at the top of Cumberland Gap summit we crossed the Kentucky, Virginia state line, also going down the mountain we crossed the Virginia-Tennessee state line.

Tennessee, Virginia and Kentucky meet about 450 yards west on top mountain. Through this famous pass Daniel Boone came in 1775, and later guided the early emigrants through here into Kentucky. During the Civil war it was of great strategic importance and was bitterly fought over, lost and won by both forces. The old rifle pits and earth works are still visible.

We left the Gap on the 8th in the rain and it rained nearly all day. The route on to Knoxville is through mountains and hills. From Knoxville to Chattanooga it is slightly rolling.

Chattanooga has much to interest the tourist. It is the center of a very interesting historical and scenic region. On top of Lookout mountain one gets a superb view of the city and the noted Moccasin Bend in the river. On clear days one can see seven states. To the east lies Missionary Ridge.

Eight miles from Chattanooga is Fort Oglethorpe and two miles further on is Chickamauga park, a national park on the site of the "Battle of Chickamauga." Here General Thomas won the title of "The Rock of Chickamauga," his courage and skill saving the Union army from a much worse defeat.

We left Chattanooga on the 9th and had very fine weather after the fog cleared away. The next town of importance is Cartersville in a rich mineral region. Here is the largest yellow ochre mine in the world. Manganese, iron and barytes are mined in large quantities, graphite and limestone also are found. Rich crops of cotton, fruit and grain grown in this favored region.

Atlanta, the capital of Georgia, and the commercial and financial center of the south-east is an interesting and thriving city. Griffin, Ga., a progressive and growing place. When the boll weevil stopped cotton raising they started growing pimento peppers and now there are several thousand acres devoted to this crop.

We left Griffin on the 10th, weather was fine. Macon, an aggressive and modern city located in the richest part of Georgia, and in the heart of the peach belt. There are 20,000,000 peach bearing trees within fifty miles. There are rich deposits of clay and much cotton manufacturing. Cardale, center of the good wire grass country. Ashburn, good dairy and large peanut-growing center. Peanut growers get from \$90 to \$100 a ton for the peanuts and raise around 900 lbs to the acre. Tifton, this modern place is an important bright tobacco center. Here is a very large tobacco drying and stemming plant. Cotton, peanuts, and high bred cattle also make it prosperous.

Valdosta, Georgia, name derived from the Spanish "Val de Ocho," a beautiful vale; is the metropolis of a fertile tobacco section, peanut and cotton region. The country in this region is practically level. We left Valdosta on the 11th and nineteen miles south we crossed the Georgia-Florida state line. We are now in the land of sunshine and flowers. Lake City, county seat of Columbia county is a busy and growing city that is an important gateway into Florida. The temperature here was 74 degrees. At St. Augustine at 1:30 p. m. it was 86 degrees. This city is the oldest town in the United States, and here we visited the oldest masonry and found graves with inscriptions 100 and 160 years old. The old Spanish fort which was 200 years in building and is now Fort Marion and is United States property contains many interesting features. We visited the old court room, chapel, fern room and the torture room and dungeons. We left St. Augustine on the 12th and on our way south passed through the Indian River country, a beautiful drive through the jungle of tropical vegetation and orange and grape fruit groves, a sight that must be seen to be appreciated. Mr. stopped at Daytona beach and saw people in bathing. This is a very pretty beach on which they have auto races. We stopped at Ft. Pierce for the night, a very prosperous and growing city. We left there on the 13th and arrived at Lake Worth at 10 a. m. having traveled 1,569 miles. We passed through West Palm Beach and drove over the bridge to Palm Beach. There is only one Palm Beach and it sure is fine. West Palm Beach is a city of over 19,000 and very busy and beautiful. Lake Worth has over 4,000 and is growing. The temperature has been from 70 to 78 degrees since we arrived, and this morning has been fair all this morning. It rained most of the afternoon and has been fine all this afternoon. Temperature now at 6 p. m. is 72 degrees. How does this seem to you folks in old Michigan who are covering around the fire to keep warm? E. G.
