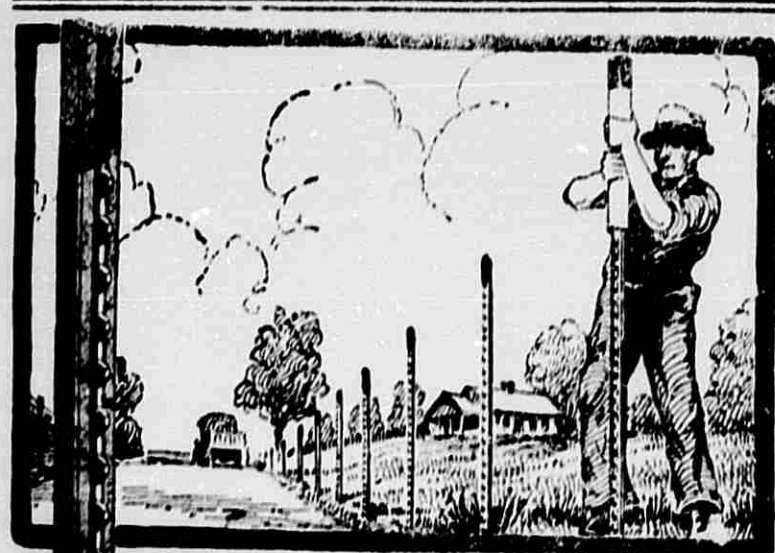

Lowell is doped to win this tournament, and if they do they will enter the state tournament which will be held at Detroit on March 24, 25, and 26.

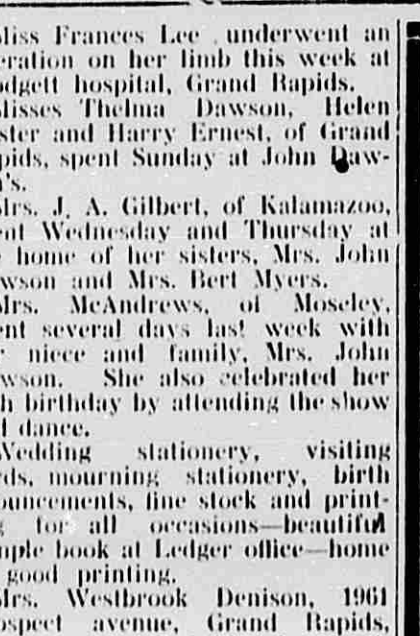
A committee working in conjunction with the Grand Rapids Y. W. C. A. has made arrangements for determining the girls' basketball championship of the county.
