VIGILANTES GET NEW IMPETUS

FINANCES TAKE UP PROBLEM OF ARMING MEN TO GUARD BANKS. LOWELL BANKS JOIN.

Organization of the vigilante movement for Kent county banks was given further impetus Monday night when representatives of 14 financial houses of the county attended a meeting of the Kent County Federation of Bankers at the Grand Rapids National bank. The federation, organized two weeks ago, has formed a protective committee of which Hugh Blacklock is chairman.

There were appointed two committees, one to report equipment and funds and the other to consider financing equipment and bonding. Hugh Blacklock, Superintendent of Police, A. A. Carroll, Sheriff Byron J. Patterson, Elmer Mur, of Rockford, D. G. Munge, of Lowell, and J. Clinton Bishop of the Old National bank were named on the first committee. The second committee comprises Earl C. Johnson, vice president of the Grand Rapids Savings bank, Harry Day, of Lowell, and C. A. Anderson, of Sparta.

It was suggested units be well armed, equipped with sawed-off guns, rifles and automatic pistols. Branch bank managers will meet with the federation May 3, to offer suggestions as to personnel of units in their districts. C. H. Dickey, Grand Rapids manager of the Michigan Bell Telephone Co., will explain the plan of broadcasting a telephone alarm in case of a bank robbery. Paul J. Ulrich, of Mt. Clemens, chairman of the protective committee of the Wolverine bankers, asserted Michigan farmers have joined forces with the vigilantes where the movement has been organized.—Grand Rapids Press.
