SCHOOL DAYS ARE CLOSING

STUDENTS AND FRIENDS HEAR BACCALAUREATE ADDRESS
BL REV. A. J. BLAIR
AT CITY HALL.

Commencement week for the seniors was inaugurated Sunday evening when Rev. A. J. Blair delivered the baccalaureate address to the thirty members of the class. The audience was rather small compared to the number of people who attend similar services in other towns. The class marched in to the tune of "Honor Song" played by the High school orchestra. Rev. John Claus offered the invocation. Mr. Clarence Haas, principal of the High school, sang a solo, accompanied by Mrs. H. L. Weeks. The audience was very appreciative of the number.

Rev. Blair Speaks.
The orator of the evening delivered a splendid message. His theme was woven around the text: "Set Your Mind on Things Above." In modern vernacular the text is: "High Your Wagon to a Star." A still more modern version is: "High Your Auto or Aeroplane To a Star." The speaker went on to say that life and success are ever challenging the best within us. An ideal must always be our guide or our lives will be a failure. The stars to which we must hitch our vehicle are: "Work, Knowledge and High Thinking, Duty and Trust." No man has ever made a success of himself without earnest, conscientious hard work. Knowledge should teach us to appreciate living rather than to teach how to earn a living. High thinking can come as a result of associating with the right sort of friends and books. Our lives should not be lived in a rut. We owe a responsibility to those about us. We must not be selfish. Above all we must not rely upon ourselves alone. We must have faith and trust in some higher authority, and that power is God. Mr. Blair's address was well received. To conclude the program Miss Roller and Mr. Gunster sang a duet.

TEACHING FORCE COMPLETE.
The Board of Education was very fortunate in securing the services of almost the entire present teaching staff for next year. Miss Kathryn Everett, who has been here for two years has resigned to continue her studies at Columbia. Miss Leone Van Arroy has resigned to accept a position elsewhere. Miss Alice Eastman, who has been teaching at the South Ward will be Miss Carr Arroy's place, and Miss Florence Althaus has been engaged as teacher of the South Ward school. Miss Everett's duties will be taken over by the other High school teachers. There will thus be one less teacher next year. The year's work has been quite satisfactory, thanks to the efficient corps of teachers. Next year emphasis will be placed more than ever upon instruction. More drill material, more checking up and perhaps a change or two in the program. The prospects for a large senior class are bright. At least fifty should graduate from this school that has an enrollment of more than 200 in the upper six grades. It is hoped that this objective will be reached within the next three or four years. Another change contemplated by the Board of Education is the organization of the High school. At present the Junior and Senior High schools are separate. Good educational procedure based upon opinions of experts demands that the High school be made a six grade affair. Other changes will undoubtedly be made.
