NOTICE TO DESTROY NOXIOUS WEEDS.

To all ownrs, possessors or occupiers of lands, or to any person or persons, firm or corporation having charge of any lands in this State: Notice is hereby given that all noxious weeds growing on any lands anywhere within the town-ship of Lowell, county of Kent, State of Michigan, or within the limits of any highway passing by or through such lands, must be cut down and destroyed on or before July 15th in townships north of

July 15th in townships north of range 16 north.

Failure to comply with this notice on or before the date mentioned or within ten days' thereafter, shall make the parties so failing liable for the costs of cutting and destroying such weeds, to be levied and collected against the property in the same manner as other taxes are levied and collected, and shall be a lien upon the land until paid in full.

If any owner, possessor or occupier of land, or any person or persons, firm or corporation having charge of any lands in this State shall, knowingly, suffer any Cana-da thistles, milkweed, wild carrots or other noxious weeds to grow theron or shall suffer the seeds to ripen, so as to cause or endanger the spread thereof, he or they shall, on conviction of competent juris-diction be liable to a fine of ten dollars, together with costs of prosecution, for every such offense and be or they shall pay the cost of cutting and destroying such weeds.
