RUNCIMAN RENTS FORD GARAGE BLDG.

FOR BROWN & SON SEED BUSINESS. EMPLOY 100 GIRLS. WILL BUILD SEED HOUSE 144x60 IN SPRING.

Our enterprising townsman, C. H. Runciman, has renewed his contract with A. J. Brown & Son, Inc., Seed Co., under conditions that will require the employment of 100 women and girls and a number of men throughout the year.

Disappointed in his plan to buy the Peckham Furniture company buildings for his purposes, he has leased the present Ford garage building for nine months, same to be vacated by the L. E. Johnson concern by September 1 and will occupy the same for seed storage by September 10, by which time the force of women and girls will be busy in the Runciman and Thomas elevators.

The garage building has dimensions of 72x115 feet and will accommodate the 50 car loads of peas and beans which will be shipped here from Saginaw and Rudyard, U. P., in addition to the 1,000 acres of local beans contracted for by Mr. Runciman for the elevators and other smaller lots that may be offered. Plans are already making for a substantial practically fireproof, brick and cement building, 144x60 feet, extending from the east end of the elevator clear through to Riverside drive where the old Snell house stands and work on the new structure is expected to start next Spring, promising more work for Lowell builders and labor.

This will involve the removal of the Snell house and Mr. Runciman will offer it for sale. This is in the nature of a free advertisement but The Ledger is tickled pink to see things moving and throws this in for a bonus free gratis for nothing.

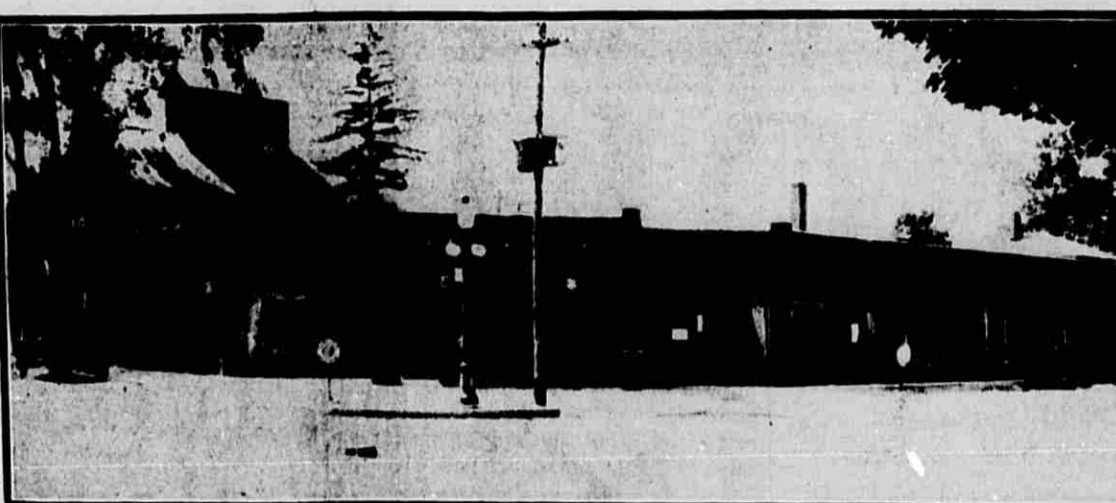

WILL SELL ON FAVORABLE TERMS TO PROSPECTIVE INDUSTRIAL CONCERN DESIRING TO LOCATE HERE.

Various rumors, good, bad, and indifferent, regarding the disposal of the Peckham Furniture company plant by the purchase of the property by the King Milling company, including the boilers, engines, water power, shafting, etc.

As the furniture working machinery has already been disposed of, the factory buildings are now available for other manufacturing purposes, and the same will be for sale to any concern desiring to locate a labor-employed industry here.

Whereas, in order to close up its affairs and give a proper title it was necessary for the Furniture company to make a cash sale, the new owners will be able and willing to sell on a contract or agreeable terms to an industrial concern desiring such an opportunity.

Regarding the water power, all available is needed by the Milling company with its two large mills and expanding business.
