1927-8 SCHOOL YEAR

ENROLLMENT SAME—TWO NEW TEACHERS—BOY SCOUTS ORGANIZE—FOOT BALL AND ATHLETICS.

The third week of school has started and the enrollment is about the same as it was a year ago. Last year the total registration on September 24, was 694, this year the total registration has reached 582. The slight falling off is due to the fact that the people of District No. 2 decided not to send their children to the village school. About thirty from this district attended the village schools in Lowell last year. The Senior High school numbers 152 pupils this year as against 130 pupils last year. The Junior High school numbers 152 as against 170. The enrollment throughout the grades is about the same as last year except in the West Ward.

NEW TEACHERS.
During vacation Miss Mary K. Williams and Miss Martha Barkana resigned their positions. Their places have been filled by Mr. Milford Finch and Miss Carroll Van Hartsdahl respectively. Otherwise the teaching force is just as it was announced last Spring.

SCHOOL ACTIVITIES BEGUN.
Several of the classes have already elected class advisers and officers. The Athletic association will organize this week. The High school faculty will meet in session to draw up a program for the entire school year some day this week. An attempt is going to be made to determine the exact date for parties, plays, athletic events and other school activities.

THE BOY SCOUTS TO ORGANIZE.
Milford Smith, brother of R. W. Finch will have charge of Boy Scouts this year. He has made plans for a banner year and will supervise and encourage many Scout activities. The school will have complete charge of this organization. It is hoped that parents will cooperate.

ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION.
What is the school athletic association? Parents will soon be bothered by their children for funds in order that the boys and girls may become members of High School Athletic association. This association has as its members any boy or girl who is a member of Junior or Senior High school, who will pay the fee of \$1.00 a semester. This organization sponsors and encourages not only athletics but any activity which would be a benefit to the school. All funds for athletics are collected and spent through the student treasurer. Members of this association are permitted to attend all athletic games free of charge. For example during the last semester about five foot ball games and seven basket ball games will be played here in Lowell. The price of admission for these games will be at least 25 cents per game. A boy or girl who becomes a member of the association will therefore save money.

Coach Finch is very optimistic over the possibilities of his grid iron warriors. He feels that Lowell High school will be ably represented in the football firmament. The line for the most part is a clean outfit, and the back field is blessed with some veterans, and likely material. The weight of the team will average about 15 pounds per man more this year than last year. Led by Captain Alexander the eleven should give all an interesting time. The team as last year will be built around eleven men, anyone of whom can be replaced by an easier player on the side lines. Coach Finch and brother Milford have had more than 30 candidates out for practice each night. On Friday of this week the team will play Coopersville, runners up for the Class "C" last year. This will be a real battle.

BIG GAME NEXT FRIDAY.
Everything has been pointed toward a big game Sept. 23, when Ionia are guests of the locals. It will be remembered that Lowell held Ionia to a 6-6 score last year. The whole town of Ionia headed by a band of 40 pieces will storm Lowell to see this game. Coach John J. Middleworth will have a wealth of material to work with this year and is determined to wipe out the score of a year ago. The best of friendly feeling exists between the two schools and it is hoped and expected that the crowd will be orderly and friendly.

Jim McMahon Gets 2,300 Volts, Lives

James McMahon had a narrow escape from death Tuesday morning while working on the Lowell power line in the transfer work being conducted in conjunction with the Michigan Bell Telephone company gang.

While handling one live wire he accidentally touched another and got a shock of 2,300 volts through his body. He fell about 30 feet and was wrenched and lamed when fetched up by his safety belt, but escaped more serious injury by the full force of the fall to the ground. He was unconscious when taken up but gradually came to his senses when taken home and given surgical aid. He was about town Wednesday with burned finger and arm and a lame body but apparently good for another hundred years.

Jim has been with us, a faithful and efficient public servant, for about twenty years and richly deserves the confidence and esteem in which he is held.

LEDGER TO HAVE ITS OWN HOME

REMOVAL TWO DOORS EAST WILL BE MADE IN MID OCTOBER AFTER MAKE READY.

After paying rent in Lowell for more than 34 years The Ledger will next month move into its own building, 214 Main street, two doors east of its present location. The three-story brick block long occupied by the A. J. Hawk & Son shoe store and the Lowell Gold Shoes. Although the papers were drawn September 28th with the King Milling company, late owners, possession will not be given until October 1, when necessary renovating and alterations of the ground floor apartment will begin preparatory to the removal which will be made as soon as the place can be made ready for its new occupant.

This is not the first time by a long way that The Ledger has shown its faith in Lowell, nor do we expect it will be the last but that is a story we will not enter upon at this time. As the change will involve a considerable expense, the kindly consideration of those who are owing The Ledger on past due accounts will be greatly appreciated.

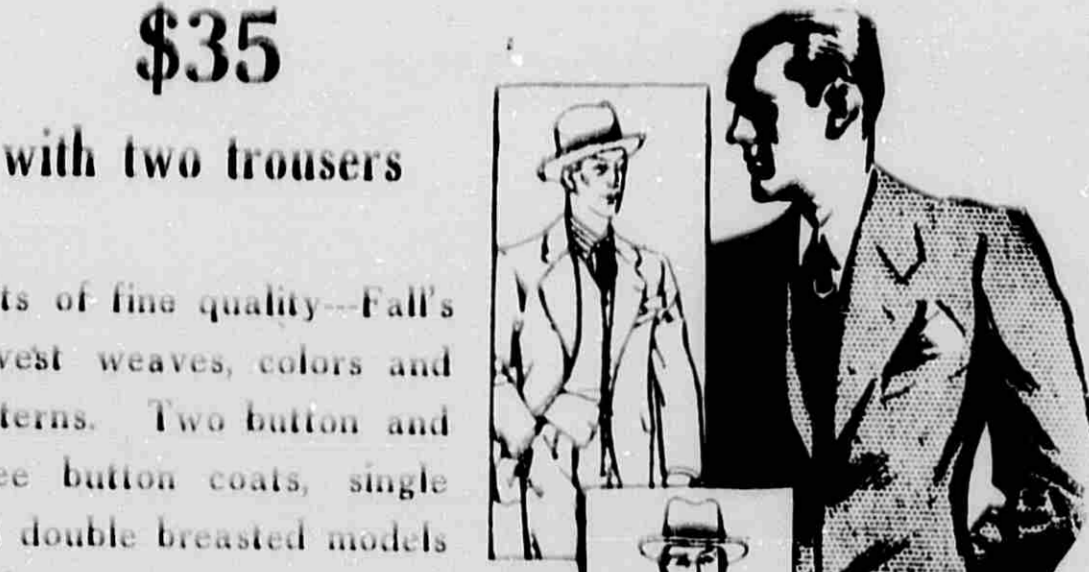

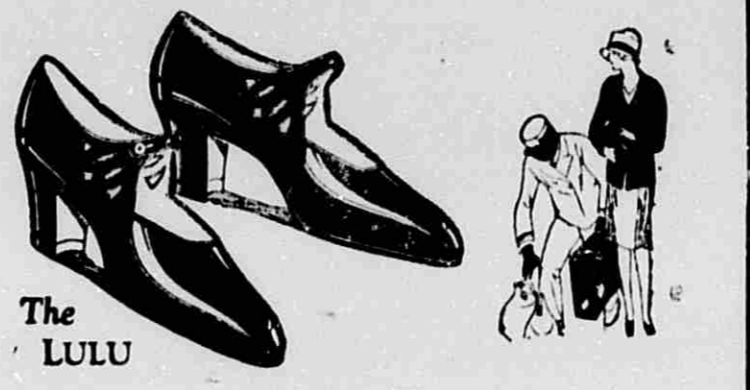
