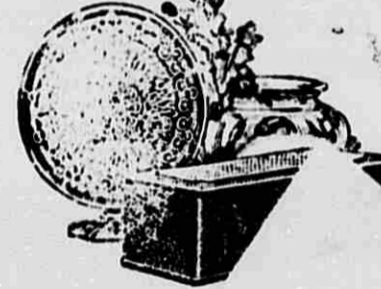

### MOBILES AND OUR SCHOOLS

LOWELL SCHOOLS SUPERINTENDENT DISCUSSES LIVE SUBJECT, SOMETHING FOR PARENTS TO PONDER.

The writer was intensely interested in a series of articles which appeared in a popular magazine two or three years ago. These articles were written by Judge Lindsey, and they dealt with the causes of juvenile delinquency. Mr. Lindsey was recently discharged because of his liberal views on marriage and divorce. We merely state this to show that this man is not a narrow-minded calamity howler. Mr. Lindsey is undoubtedly the best informed man on the standards which exist among young people today. He does not hesitate to state that one of the chief causes of juvenile delinquency is the automobile. His contentions are substantiated by facts and figures.

The Board of Regents of the University of Michigan recently decided that students could not have the use of their cars during the school year. It is well to note that these students who are denied the use of their own cars, are for the most part mature young men and women. Many other higher institutions of learning have made similar restrictions. A careful investigation has convinced college officials that there is a close correlation between: (1) Poor school work and the automobile; and (2) Moral carelessness and the automobile. In other words, college officials have learned that students who have the use of automobiles are usually poor scholars. They also blame the automobile for the present standard of morals.

The same conditions are found in our high schools. It is true that the automobile is a necessary factor in the securing of an education for many rural students, who are compelled to drive to school. But it is suggested that the use of the automobile by high school students be curtailed as much as possible.

Many youngsters needlessly drive their parents' cars about the village during the noon recess, or in the evenings. Several high schools in the state have made the ruling that no cars may leave the school grounds during the noon recess. This ruling is supposed to prevent village pupils from driving their cars to school, and it also prevents rural pupils from joy-riding at night. However, this rule is particularly effective because pupils would park their cars away from the school yard, and because some of the parents would not cooperate. The school authorities in Lowell are open to suggestions. They will cooperate in specific cases if asked to do so. Definite steps might be taken in the near future if a practical plan can be found. In the meantime it is suggested that parents watch the gas tank.

### CASCADE IS SCENE OF AUTO CRASH

SIX HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS FIGURE IN SMASH-UP ON CONCRETE APPROACH TO BRIDGE.

Two persons were injured and four others escaped harm when an automobile containing four Hiram trank high school girls and two boy students crashed into the concrete approach to the narrow bridge on US-16 at Cascade Saturday morning. Mrs. Frances Wastung, 16, of 3438 Exaline-ave., Detroit, one of the occupants, suffered deep lacerations and severe bruise. Miss Wastung's stepister, Ina Drew, was bruised.

The automobile was driven by one of the girls and the group was driving to Grand Rapids to witness the football game Saturday afternoon between the High school of Hiram and Union High school. The crash occurred, according to reports, when the automobile skidded on a slippery pavement as the brakes were applied, the driver attempted to retard her car when another vehicle obstructed the road. The automobile was wrecked. Mrs. Wastung was expected to be able to leave Blodgett hospital Saturday afternoon.

A skull fracture resulted Saturday morning to William Hopkins, 25-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Leo Hopkins, of 116 Summer-ave., N. W., when he ran around a steam roller and into the path of an automobile driven by Percy Fritz, 640 Burton-ave., N. W., at Summer-ave. and Summit-st. Police rushed the boy to Butterworth, where he lost consciousness and failed to show improvement up to early afternoon.

Motorcycle Officer William Van Herwarden was broken about the legs and abdomen Friday afternoon when his cycle crashed into the side of a small coupe operated by Lyle Hunsberger, who was proceeding along Plainfield-ave., made a left-hand turn into Oswald-st. The accident will be aired before the police investigating board Monday afternoon.—Grand Rapids Press.

### WORKING TOWARD IONIA COUNTY WITH PAVEMENT.

Gradually M-21, the trunk line on which Ionia, Lyons and Pawama are located, is being converted into a paved road. Two miles have been completed from the city limits of Grand Rapids to the Grand Trunk crossing, and last week bids were opened for continuing the cement from that point to Ada. The contract calls for completion by August 15, 1928.

Gov. Green last week suggested to the state administrative board that US-16 be widened from a 20-foot cement driveway to one of 40 feet from Brighton to the Seven Mile road in Detroit, a distance of 30 miles. Eventually widening will be done the whole length of the highway, it is believed, owing to the heavy traffic, which is growing greater every year.—(Portland Review.)

### Blames Liquor For Auto Tragedy

Sheriff Byron J. Patterson Friday said he would ask a manslaughter warrant for August Slood, 46, of Grandville, who is alleged to have sold liquor to Hugh McLennan, 30, son of a Chicago contractor and real estate man, who was killed Thursday evening when the car he was driving somersaulted into a ditch in M21 a mile west of Grand Rapids city limits.

Slood is in custody, having been arrested following a raid on his home at Division-ave. and White-st., Grandville, in which a quart of whiskey, two five-gallon containers, which raiders said had held hard liquor, and 200 bottles of beer were seized.

Deputies Hiram Bouma and Martin King, who conducted the raid and made the arrest, said Slood was ready to plead guilty to a liquor charge.

Companion Tells Story. On the strength of the story told by Sigmund Peterfreund, 28, of New York, the dead man's companion on the ride, Sheriff Patterson ordered his deputies to make the raid without a search warrant and to gather such evidence as was needed to prosecute a man-slaughter charge. Peterfreund told the sheriff that just a few minutes before the tragedy McLennan had thrown away a pint bottle which had held moonshine purchased at Slood's place. Peterfreund accompanied the officers on the raid to point out the house. He told Sheriff Patterson he had intended to stop at Muskegon to get a job. The sheriff read a letter of recommendation Peterfreund carried and he will not be held the sheriff said.

Slood's place has been under the eye of the sheriff's officers for several months. According to Deputy Hiram Bouma, whose residence is in Grandville, the place was notorious but it had been impossible to obtain evidence for a search warrant.—Grand Rapids Press.
