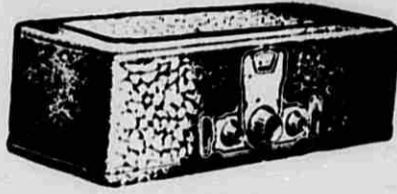

Christmas Seals Sale Now On

It took four and a quarter millions of Christmas seals to fill letters for the mailing list of the Grand Rapids Anti-tuberculosis society. The sale will start on Thanksgiving Day and continue until Christmas. It will be conducted entirely through the mail, some people receiving a dollar's worth and a selected list will receive two dollars worth. None will be placed in schools to be sold by the children either in Grand Rapids or rural Kent county.

Several years ago we had school children sell seals as a health educational feature. Now the Modern Health Crusade is conducted by grade teachers and so much is being taught in our schools along the line of health and hygiene that we feel the busy school teachers may well be relieved of this extra task," stated Edward F. Perkins, president of the society.

The money thus raised last year helped to carry a program that has reached thousands of lives in Grand Rapids. The field nurses made 554 visits to schools, gave 491 health talks to young children, reaching about 14,000 with this type of education. The society awarded badges to 4,844 Health Knights in the Modern Health Crusade. Four hundred patients were examined in 27 free chest clinics held in Byron Center, Caledonia, Cedar Springs, Grandville, Kent City, Lowell, Rockford, Sand Lake and Sparta. The two nurses made 1,778 educational visits to homes and arranged sanatorium care for seventeen cases of active tuberculosis.

Plans for 1928 include in addition a campaign of health education in industries, particularly in the value of periodical health examinations as a means to prolong life and happiness.

Three-fourths of the funds raised through the sale of Christmas seals are used by the local organization, 20% is used for the state wide campaign and 5% sent to the National Tuberculosis association to help carry their campaign over the entire nation and conduct intensive research, seeking a vaccine or serum against the disease.

MR. AND MRS. B. F. WILKINSON, As They Appeared at Their Golden Wedding Anniversary.

Well Known Keene Woman's Sudden Death

Mrs. B. F. Wilkinson, a widely known old resident of Keene township, died very suddenly at the home of her grandson, Floyd Sparks at 10 p. m. Friday, aged 75 years. Funeral services were held at the Sparks home at 2 p. m., Tuesday; burial in Saranac cemetery by the side of her late husband.

Jennie Elizabeth Lee, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Archibald Lee, was born at Lake Odessa, May 2, 1857, and in her childhood moved to Saranac, where the most of her girlhood was spent.

She married Brayton E. Wilkinson, Oct. 4, 1876, and the following Spring moved to their farm home north-west of Saranac, where many happy hours were spent.

Four children were born to them: Hattie, Mrs. Robert Sparks, who died May 19, 1909; Play, Mrs. George Golds, of Keene; Manton B., and Milton A., both of Saranac.

In the Spring of 1886 they moved to the farm at Keene church corners where they spent the remainder of their lives.

In October 1920, their golden wedding anniversary was pleasantly celebrated by a large company of friends and relatives on Jan. 10, 1923, Mr. Wilkinson's busy life closed as suddenly as did that of his widow five years later.

Besides her children, Mrs. Wilkinson is mourned by eight grand children, eight great grand children, and a truly great host of friends.

For thirty-four years Mrs. Wilkinson was a faithful correspondent of The Lowell Ledger, rendering to us, our readers and her community a great service that will never be excelled.

That the publisher, his family, correspondents and readers will sorrow for her departure goes without saying.

Ionia Girl Dead, 2 Hurt in Crash

Ionia, Nov. 24.—Stella Williams, 27, of 28 N. Jefferson street, this city, was instantly killed; her sister, Ruth, 25, is suffering from shock, bruises and lacerations; Irene McDonald, 21, of 10 Weston St., is unconscious in Community hospital, and Jerry Phelps, 25, of 921 Hackett St., is under arrest for driving while drunk as the result of an automobile crash on M 21 near the state hospital for the criminal insane near here early this morning.

The party of four, all in a light coupe, were en route to a pre-holiday dance at Saranac when the machine left the road, struck a tree and turned over.

Injured to Recover.
Passing motorists, who from a distance saw the car plunge down the embankment, notified night guards at the state institution. The two injured girls were taken to Community hospital.

Stella sustained a fracture of the skull which caused instant death. Irene, whose condition is serious, suffered injuries to the head and neck and bruises about the body. She is expected to recover, however, barring development of internal injuries. Ruth's condition was said to be not serious.

Coroner Summons Jury.
Phelps, the only one to escape injury, was immediately placed under arrest by Sheriff Wm. Franch and probably will be charged with manslaughter.

Coroner M. J. Bradley removed Stella's body to his undertaking rooms and impounded a jury which will conduct an inquest today. The jury is composed of Emil Lange, Max Wilson, Dr. R. B. Whitten, Max Webber, Arthur Stone and Ford Rowley.

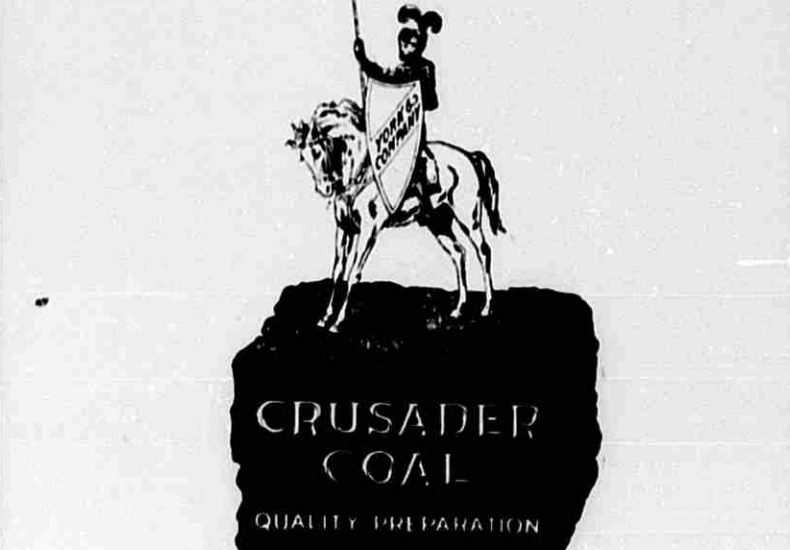
