Foreman Stock Takes National Egg Record

Crash Kills Two at Lowell G. T. Crossing

The Grand Trunk railway crossing three-fourths of a mile south of Lowell was the scene of a fatal accident Monday morning, in which Simon Mishler, 51, of Bowne township and his daughter Velma 19, a country school teacher, lost their lives, when their automobile crashed into a Grand Trunk freight car engine. Miss Mishler died immediately and her father, who was taken to Ridgely hospital, Grand Rapids, died soon after his arrival there.

The car, driving through to the Dully school at Sargeons, where she was teaching, approaching the crossing from the steep hill on the south. This is a dangerous approach at any time, especially so when the hill is slippery as was the case that morning.

Justice Springlet, acting coroner, impaneled a jury. Gain Bangs, Paul Kellogg, Harry Waters, Howard Bart, Charles Knapp, Ed. Gonyea, but it is doubted if it will be called upon to hear evidence in the case.

Theodore Shepard, section foreman, declared he had found it in perfect order. Lewis Morse, freight agent, substantiated his declaration. Frank Stevens, garage proprietor in the immediate vicinity of the crash, said he saw the accident and averred the wigwag was not working at the time of the collision. Shepard and Mr. Bettis, the passenger agent, who saw the crash from a window in the station, said Mrs. Mishler's car was traveling at between 20 and 25 miles an hour.

Engineer Albert Quigley, of Durand, told the justice he did not see the automobile until it was on the right, while Francis Charles Pierce, also of Durand, was near the accident until the engine was brought to a stop. Both declare the warning whistle and bell had been sounding for the crossing.

The girls' body was removed to the O. J. Yeiter chapel in Lowell and it was expected Mr. Mishler would be returned here from Grand Rapids Monday afternoon. Arrangements for burial funeral services had not been completed Monday noon.

Fallsburg Park Goes

A voluntary action on the part of the Consumers Power company has permitted the county park commission to prepare to proceed with the closing options on the proposed 77-acre park along Flat river north of Fallsburg and has assured to the county the establishment of a beautiful recreation spot near the site of one of the county's first settlements.

The park commission announced yesterday the receipt of a stipulation from Atty. Clyde Holmes of Jackson, counsel for the power company, which eliminates a fear that the existence of water rights in the river might prevent the county from acquiring the property. Warren R. Lovessent, chairman of the commission, expressed to the public the appreciation of the willingness to assist in the preservation for the public of one of the beauty spots in the county.

Won't Hurt Park.
 Flowing through the park site and into Flat river is a little stream known as Page creek. The power company, through its engineers, made an investigation of levels and considered the possible uses it might make of the river and then announced it will give the county a stipulation that it will never raise the level of Flat river at that point above the normal outlet of Page creek into the stream.

In addition, it offers to the county a pretty island in the center of the river which the park commission never had any hopes of acquiring. The only requirement sought from the county is that it will never use the river for power purposes.

No serious obstacles remain in the way of acquiring and developing the property for park purposes, the commission said yesterday. (Grand Rapids Herald, Feb. 22.)
