

State Park on Grand River Near Lowell

Lansing, March 2.—A 30,000-acre tract of state-owned land in Emmet county, between Wolverine and Petoskey, is to be converted into a state forest, the conservation commission decided today. The land has been listed as a refuge.
According to Harold Tulus, head of the forestry committee, experiments show the tract is excellently adapted to producing all kinds of timber.
The commission authorized enlargement of two state parks by the addition of 240 acres of Fife Lake and 80 acres at Higgins Lake.
The state's largest timber tract in Muskegon county, is to be preserved. The commission directed Marcus Schaaf, chief forester, to survey the tree and surroundings. Enough standing timber will be acquired around the giant, which is 160 feet high and has a base of 17 feet, to protect against wind.
A petition was received by the commission asking that G. A. R. veterans be granted free licenses to take one deer a year. No action was taken.
The commission announced a willingness to accept as a state park a tract of land along the Grand river in Kent county between Ada and Lowell. It is expected the county will donate the land.
The commission decided to abandon state participation in the Custer refuge at Camp Custer. The refuge was stocked principally for dog trials. It was reported the cost is about \$2,000 a year and thus far stock has not been successful.
Fife Lake and Higgins Lake state parks were enlarged by the acquisition of 240 acres for the former and 80 acres for the latter.
Negotiations may result in commercial reforestation are to be opened with the Manistique Pulp company. The company wishes to acquire state owned land which it would reforest and keep in production of selective cutting.
Cut Bass Restrictions.
The commission rounded out its program of fishing regulations for the 1928 season by lifting the early fishing ban on a number of lakes, opening a number of trout streams authorizing trolling from motor boats on several large inland lakes and reducing the legal size of bass from 12 to 10 inches.
Most of the trout streams opened for the coming season were in the upper peninsula. They include, in addition to many smaller creeks, Cooper creek and Swanson creek and Pond in Mason county.
The lakes on which trolling from a motor boat was authorized include Higgins, Houghton, Crystal in Benzie county; Burt and Mullett in Cheboygan county and Grand in Presque Isle.
The lakes exempted by the order prohibiting fishing of any kind from April 1 to June 15, include Crooked, Emmett, Missaukee, Missaukee county; Cadillac and Mitchell, Wexford county; Barr, Manistee county, and lower Hamline, Mason county.
Contains 2,345 Acres.
A plan to obtain by gift a state park of upwards of 1,500 acres along both sides of Grand river between Ada and Lowell was divulged yesterday by Kent County Engineer O. S. Hess after the state conservation commission formally announced its willingness to accept the tract and place it in the state park system as the land is acquired.
The county park commission, through its engineer, has surveyed the property bounded on the north by M-21 and on the south by the South Lowell river road and lying between Ada and Lowell. Maps of this area, which contains 2,345 acres, have been placed before the state officials.
Exclude Farm Land.
Considerable of this area is good farm land and would be excluded from the park project. A large area is held by the Grand Trunk railroad as its right-of-way on the south side of the river.
With approval of the state officials efforts will be made to induce some residents of the county to purchase the property which, it is estimated, would cost about \$20,000, and to turn it over to the county and state as a memorial.
The state is also being asked to contribute generously toward the cost of purchasing a 150-acre park on the west side of the Grand Rapids belt line. The site lies just across Grand river from Grandville. —(Grand Rapids Herald.)

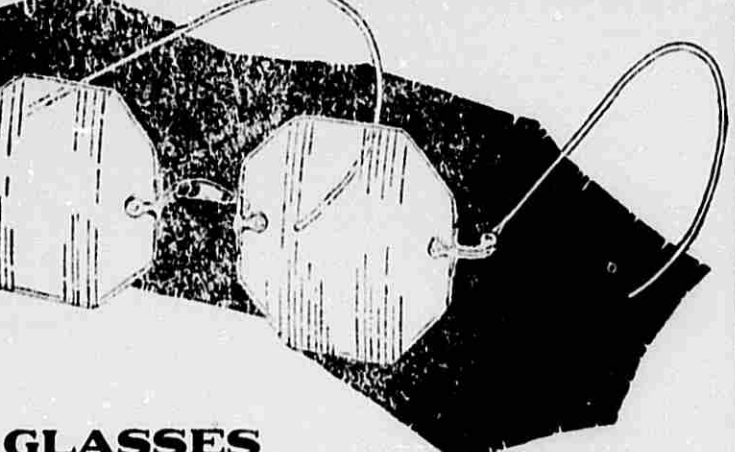

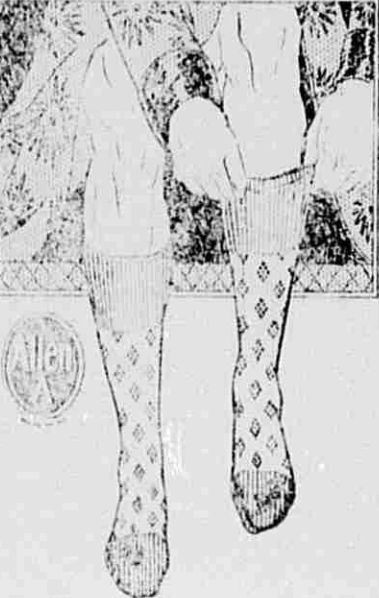

State Park on Grand River Near Lowell

Lansing, March 2.—A 30,000-acre tract of state-owned land in Emmet county, between Wolverine and Petoskey, is to be converted into a state forest, the conservation commission decided today. The land has been listed as a refuge.

According to Harold Titts, head of the forestry committee, experts show the tract is excellently adapted to producing all kinds of timber.

The commission authorized enlargement of two state parks by the addition of 240 acres of Fife Lake and 80 acres at Higgins lake.

The state's largest pine tree in Missaukee county, is to be preserved. The commission directed Marcus Schauf, chief forester, to survey the tree and surrounding timber. Enough standing timber will be cut around the giant, which is 100 feet high and has a base of 17 feet, to protect it against wind.

A petition was received by the commission asking that A. H. veterinarians be granted free licenses to take one deer a year. No action was taken.

The commission announced a willingness to accept as a state park a tract of land along the Grand river in Kent county between Ada and Lowell. It is expected the county will donate the land.

The commission decided to abandon state participation in the Custer refuge at Camp Custer. The refuge was stocked principally for dog trials. It was reported the cost is about \$2,000 a year and thus far stocking has not been successful.

Fife lake and Higgins lake state parks were enlarged by the acquisition of 240 acres for the former and 80 acres for the latter.

Negotiations which may result in commercial reforestation are to be opened with the Manistique Pulp company. The company wishes to acquire state owned land which it would reforest and keep in production of selective cutting.

Cut Bass Restrictions

The commission rounded out its program of fishing regulations for the 1928 season by lifting the early fishing ban on a number of lakes, opening a number of trout streams, authorizing trolling from motor boats on several large inland lakes and reducing the legal size of bass from 12 to 10 inches.

Most of the trout streams opened for the coming season were in the
