### Eighty Men at M21 Road Camp Now

Eighty men are being comfortably housed and substantially fed at the Fox Corners Road Construction barracks while the work on the new M 21 pavement is under way.

The Ledger publisher is indebted to Deputy Pat Bowes for the privilege of inspecting the camp and seeing the men at their supper, his idea being to reassure the people of Lowell that these boys, who are temporarily detained at Ionia are not vicious or dangerous to this community but good average boys who are doing short terms for minor offenses, and are glad to be here on an open-air job and no one need worry for fear of harm from them, as Pat says: "You couldn't drive them away with a club."

It is expected that the gang will be increased to 150 by June 1 and accommodations will be provided accordingly.

There are buildings for offices, kitchen and dining hall, with refrigerator for meats and perishable supplies, barracks, shower baths with warm water and the buildings are heated and lighted. A well furnished medicine cabinet is also provided, and Dr. Litner, the institution doctor from Ionia, attends the ailing when his services are needed.

Good substantial meals suitable for men at hard work in the open are provided and an effort is made to provide reasonable variation through the week.

The kitchen and dining hall floors and tables and utensils are scrubbed scrupulously clean and the character of the meals are served is shown by the Saturday menu which the scribe selected as a fair average:

Breakfast—2 fried eggs, potatoes, preserves, bread and coffee with sugar and milk.

Dinner—Fried liver, boiled potatoes, stewed corn, bread and gravy, tea or milk.

Supper—Baked hash, dessert, bread, butter, tea.

The camp cook informed the scribe that the menu is often more generous than shown, including items such as oat meal porridge, corn meal mush and "Johnny bread."

Breakfast is served at 5:30 at the camp, dinner delivered by truck on the road job at noon and supper again at the camp at 6:30.

At the bunk house, the men are permitted to read, play cards or amuse themselves as they choose until 9 o'clock when lights are turned off.

Mr. Bowes is on duty twelve hours as night guard and makes a tour of camp inspection every half hour.

The Ledger will send a bundle of papers to the camp every Saturday by Mr. Bowes and if the people of Lowell care to contribute magazines to these boys away from home, they can be left at the Ledger office and they will be delivered in the same way and will be duly appreciated.

### Asahel Fairchild Struck By Automobile

Asahel Fairchild, an old and well-known Ada township farmer, was fatally injured when struck down by an automobile driven by Walter Hall, 21, when he stepped out into Main street in front of the M. W. Gee hardware store in Lowell Saturday noon.

The injured man was first taken to Dr. S. S. Lee's office and then rushed to Blodgett hospital in the Yeiter ambulance but was unconscious on arrival there and died soon after of fracture of the skull.

According to witnesses, interviewed by R. E. Springett, acting coroner, no blame attaches to Hall, who applied his brakes and turned out to avoid hitting Mr. Fairchild, and the front end of the car did miss him, but he was hit and knocked down by the rear end, as Hall endeavored to swing the car around the corner to the south.

Springett at once swore in a jury to act in case Prosecutor Earl W. Munshaw should order an inquest and these were the men named: Harry Waters, Jacob Blough, W. Long, Frank Quillan, V. E. Ashley, Carl Freyermuth.

Mr. Fairchild was 74 years old and is survived by his wife, Mrs. Delphine Fairchild, a son Ansel who lives at the farm home, and two daughters, Mrs. Grace Kellogg of Moseley and Mrs. Clint Weeks of Lowell.

Funeral services were held at the Fairchild home Monday at 2 p. m., Rev. J. H. Westbrook officiating clergyman; burial in Bailey cemetery.

### W. J. Watterson Cascade Pioneer Killed by Auto

Traffic accidents in and near Grand Rapids yesterday caused the death of one person and injured seven others, one seriously.

Within a few feet of the corner where he has lived all his life, William J. Watterson, 75, of Cascade, pioneer resident of Kent county and supervisor of his township 21 years, was killed last night when struck by an auto driven by Otto Cornell, 18, son of a neighbor of the aged man.

His son John, was within a few feet of his aged father at the time he was struck and called in vain to him to look out for the auto, while prevented from going to his assistance by another car approaching from the other direction.

Says Victim Unobserved.

Cornell, with another youth and two girls, were driving toward Grand Rapids and did not see Watterson until after his auto had struck him, he said. The second car, approaching from the other direction is said to have obscured his vision with bright lights and his first intimation that there had been an accident came when he felt the jar of the man's body on his fender.

Watterson, in company with his son Clyde, proprietor of a store at Cascade, had tried out a motor boat on the Thornapple river in the afternoon, and after stopping a short time at the store said he was going home to eat. John stated he would walk with him, but while he was getting his coat, his father started out the door.

His home is across the road and a short distance west of his son's store and he walked directly across the road, John being but a few feet behind him. John, noting the approach of the car driven by Cornell and also one driving east, called to his father, but apparently he failed to hear the warning.

Thrown Over Headlight.

He had nearly reached the opposite side of the pavement when the right front fender and headlight of Cornell's auto struck him. He was thrown over the headlight and hung with his body resting on the fender until Cornell brought his auto to a stop when he was thrown over with his head striking the ground.

Dr. Simeon LeRoy, coroner, was called and viewed the body at the S. H. Metcalf & Co., undertaking establishment, and said death was evidently due to a fracture of the skull at the base of the brain. He suffered also a fracture of both legs and lacerations and bruises about the body.

Cornell is said to have stopped his auto in a short distance and, with the assistance of Clyde Watterson, carried the aged man into his home. Metcalf's ambulance was summoned but he died a few minutes before it arrived.

Besides being supervisor, Watterson was well known to residents of Cascade and vicinity as the sexton of the church there, which position he occupied 10 years.

Besides his two sons, he is survived by his widow, two sisters, Anna Smith, of Portland, Ore., and Mary Smith, of Bellingham, Wash., and seven grandchildren. Funeral services will be held at 2 o'clock Wednesday afternoon from the Cascade church under the auspices of the Ada lodge, F. and A. M. Burial will be in Cascade cemetery—Grand Rapids Herald.

### Eighty Men at M21 Road Camp Now

Eighty men are being comfortably housed and substantially fed at the Fox Corners Road Construction barracks while the work on the new M 21 pavement is under way.

The Ledger publisher is indebted to Deputy Pat Bowes for the privilege of inspecting the camp and seeing the men at their supper, his idea being to reassure the people of Lowell that these boys, who are temporarily detained at Ionia are not vicious or dangerous to this community but good average boys who are doing short terms for minor offenses, and are glad to be here on an open-air job and no one need to worry for fear of harm from them, as Pat says: "You couldn't drive them away wid a club."

It is expected that the gang will be increased to 150 by June 1 and accommodations will be provided accordingly.

There are buildings for offices, kitchen and dining hall, with refrigerator for meats and perishable supplies, barracks, shower baths with warm water and the buildings are heated and lighted. A well furnished medicine cabinet is also provided, and Dr. Limer, the institution doctor from Ionia, attends the ailing when his services are needed.

Good substantial meals suitable for men at hard work in the open are provided and an effort is made to provide reasonable variation through the week.

The kitchen and dining hall floors and tables and utensils are scrubbed scrupulously clean and the character of the meals served is shown by the Saturday menu which the scribe selected as a fair average:

Breakfast—2 fried eggs, potatoes, preserves, bread and coffee with sugar and milk.

Dinner—Fried liver, boiled potatoes, stewed corn, bread and gravy, tea or milk.

Supper—Baked hash, dessert, bread, butter, tea.

The camp cook informed the scribe that the menu is often more generous than shown, including items such as oat meal porridge, corn meal mush and "Johnny bread."

Breakfast is served at 5:30 at the camp, dinner delivered by truck on the road job at noon and supper again at the camp at 6:30.

At the bunk house, the men are permitted to read, play cards or amuse themselves as they choose until 9 o'clock when lights are turned off.

Mr. Bowes is on duty twelve hours as night guard and makes a tour of camp inspection every half hour.

The Ledger will send a bundle of papers to the camp every Saturday by Mr. Bowes and if the people of Lowell care to contribute magazines to these boys away from home, they can be left at the Ledger office and they will be delivered in the same way and will be duly appreciated.

### Asashel Fairchild Struck By Automobile

Asashel Fairchild, an old and well-known Ada township farmer, was fatally injured when struck down by an automobile driven by Walter Hall, 21, when he stepped out into Main street in front of the M. W. Gee hardware store in Lowell Saturday noon. The injured man was first taken to Dr. S. S. Lee's office and then rushed to Blodgett hospital in the Yeiter ambulance but was unconscious on arrival there and died soon after of fracture of the skull.

According to witnesses, interviewed by R. E. Springett, acting coroner, no blame attaches to Hall, who applied his brakes and turned out to avoid hitting Mr. Fairchild, and the front end of the car did miss him, but he was hit and knocked down by the rear end, as Hall endeavored to swing the car around the corner to the south.

Springett at once swore in a jury to act in case Prosecutor Earl W. Munshaw should order an inquest and these were the men named: Harry Waters, Jacob Blough, W. Long, Frank Quillan, V. E. Ashley, Carl Freyermuth.

Mr. Fairchild was 74 years old and is survived by his wife, Mrs. Delphine Fairchild, a son Ansel who lives at the farm home, and two daughters, Mrs. Grace Kellogg of Moseley and Mrs. Clint Weeks of Lowell.

Funeral services were held at the Fairchild home Monday at 2 p. m., Rev. J. H. Westbrook officiating clergyman; burial in Bailey cemetery.

### W. J. Watterson Cascade Pioneer Killed by Auto

Traffic accidents in and near Grand Rapids yesterday caused the death of one person and injured seven others, one seriously.

Within a few feet of the corner where he has lived all his life, William J. Watterson, 75, of Cascade, pioneer resident of Kent county and supervisor of his township 21 years, was killed last night when struck by an auto driven by Otto Cornell, 18, son of a neighbor of the aged man.

His son John, was within a few feet of his aged father at the time he was struck and called in vain to him to look out for the auto, while prevented from going to his assistance by another car approaching from the other direction.

Says Victim Unobserved.

Cornell, with another youth and two girls, were driving toward Grand Rapids and did not see Watterson until after his auto had struck him, he said. The second car, approaching from the other direction is said to have obscured his vision with bright lights and his first intuition that there had been an accident came when he felt the jar of the man's body on his fender.

Watterson, in company with his son Clyde, proprietor of a store at Cascade, had tried out a motor boat on the Thornapple river in the afternoon, and after stopping a short time at the store said he was going home to eat. John stated he would walk with him, but while he was getting his coat, his father started out the door.

His home is across the road and a short distance west of his son's store and he walked directly across the road, John being but a few feet behind him. John, noting the approach of the car driven by Cornell and also one driving east, called to his father, but apparently he failed to hear the warning.

Thrown Over Headlight.

He had nearly reached the opposite side of the pavement when the right front fender and headlight of Cornell's auto struck him. He was thrown over the headlight and hung with his body resting on the fender until Cornell brought his auto to a stop when he was thrown over with his head striking the ground.

Dr. Simeon LeRoy, coroner, was called and viewed the body at the S. H. Metcalf & Co., undertaking establishment, and said death was evidently due to a fracture of the skull at the base of the brain. He suffered also a fracture of both legs and lacerations and bruises about the body.

Cornell is said to have stopped his auto in a short distance and, with the assistance of Clyde Watterson, carried the aged man into his home. Metcalf's ambulance was summoned but he died a few minutes before it arrived.

Besides being supervisor, Watterson was well known to residents of Cascade and vicinity as the sexton of the church there, which position he occupied 10 years.

Besides his two sons, he is survived by his widow, two sisters, Anna Smith, of Portland, Ore., and Mary Smith, of Bellingham, Wash., and seven grandchildren. Funeral services will be held at 2 o'clock Wednesday afternoon from the Cascade church under the auspices of the Ada lodge, F. and A. M. Burial will be in Cascade cemetery.—(Grand Rapids Herald).
